Death of Mr. Ingram.
Mr. John Ingram, who was found in an unconscious condition in the

engine-room of Thompson's Mills a few days ago, died last night at his residence, 186 Clarence street. Mr. Ingram was 67 years old, and never recovered from the paralytic stroke with which he was stricken while attending to his duties as night watchman in the mill. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon at Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Tribesmen Coming.
A large number of the tribesmen of the Orient Order of Humility and Perfection, of St. Thomas, will come to London in a special train on June 5, for the purpose of conferring the perfection degree upon a number of candidates in the Oddfellows' Hall here. The Oriental Order is to the Oddfellows what the Shriners are to the Masons. The first degree only may be conferred by the lodges, the perfection degree coming within the province of the grand lodge.

Fail Lecture Course.
The London Froebel Society has recently completed the arrangements for a course of six lectures by Prof. Earl Barnes on "The History of Civilization." The lectures will be given in St. Andrew's Hall on six successive Thursdays, from Oct. 15 to Nov. 19. Mr. Barnes returned from England a year ago, after a three years' residence there, much of the time being spent in research work in the British Museum. He has at present a press a work on "The History of Civilization," and another on "European History." The Froebel Society feel that this is one of the most valuable courses they have ever undertaken. Course tickets will be issued in September.

Circus Day
SHOW TOMORROW
Preparations Completed and the Special Trains Arrive Early.

Early tomorrow morning Cole Brothers' World Famous Shows will arrive here, and circus day will be realized to the very fullest extent. Queries Answered.
TILE DRAIN—A has an open ditch running across his farm; said ditch coming out of B's farm, draining part of his property, all in open ditch. A desires to tile his portion. A part of A's ditch runs through wood lot, leaves and sticks from which would obstruct tiles. B does not wish to tile the said portion? 2. If not, can A compel B to fix boxes or other contrivances to keep sticks and leaves from entering into and obstructing tiles? 3. Can A compel B to pay difference in price occasioned by the use of larger tile needed in order to carry water off B's property?

ANS.—Upon the facts stated, and assuming that this open ditch properly carries off all the water, A cannot compel B to tile his part, nor to fix boxes to prevent obstructions, nor to pay for larger tile on A's property. If, however, the present open ditch does not effectively drain the properties of all concerned, the whole matter can be referred to the township engineer to make an award under the ditches and watercourses act, which awards will define the kind of ditch and apportion the cost between the parties. MR. McEVOY TO THE ELECTORS

Continued From Page One.

against the expressed will of the people of London, and opposed a scheme both worthy and necessary simply because it was not his scheme. (Cheers?)

The Power Scheme.
Mr. McEVOY subjected the power scheme to a severe criticism, and showed how manifestly unfair it was to London, as compared with the other cities, especially Hamilton and Toronto. He had challenged Mr. Beck to discuss the figures of that contract, but Mr. Beck had refused to do so. Mr. Beck will only say that the power will be delivered in London at cost, but would not commit himself, or the commission, to what the cost of the power will be. If Mr. McEVOY's figures were wrong, why did not Mr. Beck show them to be wrong? Why did he not criticise them, and show the mistakes, if any, that had been made. He would not do that. The municipalities were committed as soon as the contract was signed to take power from the commission for thirty years at cost price, no matter what happened. The contract was unfair and Mr. Beck knew it.

Mr. Jared Vining and Ald. Armstrong also spoke. They dealt with the issues of the campaign. The Whitney administration was criticised because of the iniquitous gerrymandering, which could not be defended on any grounds whatever save that of political expediency, and also on its temperance legislation. The three-fifths clause was an unfair handicap, and was not worthy of any government. The action of the council in regard to Niagara power was also dealt with.

The meeting broke up with cheers for Mr. McEVOY, Hon. A. G. MacKay and the King.

The Second Meeting.
At the meeting held at the corner of Horton and Waterloo streets, another large crowd was present.

Mr. Alex. Stuart, K.C., was chairman, and introduced Mr. C. G. Jarvis. The latter dealt with political questions in a splendid manner. He subjected the Whitney Government to a scathing criticism on its record of broken pledges. Mr. Whitney had promised many things, but had failed to keep many of those promises. (Cheers.)

The surplus of which Mr. Whitney boasted so much was due to the splendid financial legislation inaugurated by the Liberal governments preceding it. Mr. Whitney had placed no constructive financial legislation on the statute books, and had merely collected the taxes on the acts made by the Liberals.

Mr. Whitney's vilification of public men was also unfavorably commented on. Mr. Whitney had called men "chiselers" who had served the Province just as long and just as unselfishly as Mr. Whitney. (Cheers.)

Ald. Ferguson followed, and gave a strong criticism of the Conservative party. It had failed to enact the legislation it had promised, and in the gerrymander it had shown that it was unworthy of the name of an advantage.

The Beck horse deal was also condemned. Ald. Ferguson showed that Mr. Beck and Mr. Whitney did not offer the same explanation of this famous deal. Mr. Whitney put the whole transaction up to Mr. Beck, while Mr. Beck put it onto others.

Mr. McEVOY followed and was given an ovation. He dealt with the tuberculosis hospital and the power question at considerable length, and made a convincing speech on these matters.

The meeting broke up with cheers for the candidate, Mr. McEVOY, Hon. A. G. MacKay and the King.
