Labor to Gather Great Crop a Problem - West Looking to Ontario.

Winnipeg, Man., July 14.—The rosy outlook for an enormous crop in Western Canada this year has brought with it doubts as to the equipment of the country for the harvesting of the grain, and should the present fayorable weather continue for another fortnight, there is bound to be a considerable shortage, both of men and material. Conditions this year have tended to create a great disparity between the expectations and what the realization will probably be, and the enormously increased acreage and the marvelous yield that is promised have created a situation that the authorities may find it difficult to cope with. The official reports show that this year there are 9,600,000 acres of grain crops in the west, of which 6,000,000 acres are devoted to wheat, 2,600,900 acres to oats and 1,000,000 to barley. With the heavy growth that has been reported from all sections, it is probable that even the most optimistic estimates of the harvest may be realized, and an army of men will be
