For the annual meeting of the N. B. Tourist, Game and Resources Association, in this city this afternoon, the secretary-treasurer presented a report in which he reviewed the year and predicted a good tourist season for 1926 in this province.

His resignation as secretary-treasurer of the association was tendered to the board of directors at the meeting.

Early in June we closed our membership campaign and called in the results from the different banks, amounting to nearly \$17,000.

After the annual meeting I notified those who were elected as vice-presidents and members of the executive.

As there had been some complaint about the road to the border, I thought it advisable to take a trip down and see conditions for myself.

The hotels in St. Andrews were all filled to capacity and report this year's business as very much ahead of last.

July 28, we received a contribution of \$3 from W. S. Fisher, a former president of this association, and one who has always taken a keen interest in the work.

We obtained and contributed a number of interesting photos of New Brunswick scenery to the Natural Resources Intelligence Service at Ottawa for use in the preparation of New Brunswick literature by their department.

In August we sent out inquiries to 22 tourist camps in New Brunswick for details of their facilities and attractions.

We furnished to the leading hotels attractive wall cards with condensed information and advertising the New Brunswick Tourist Association, to be hung on the wall of each room in the hotel.
