Armistice Day Observance in King Square Wednesday Morning

Post Office Scene of Earlier Remembrance of Soldier Dead—Two Minute's Silence

Armistice Day, tomorrow, is to be fittingly observed in Saint John when on the request of Acting-Mayor J. H. Frink there will be a two minute's silence period arranged, a fire alarm signal being blown to mark the commencement of the period at 11 o'clock and its close at 11:02 a.m.

This year, for the first time, there will be a commemorative service in front of the civic war memorial in King square.

As tomorrow will be the first anniversary of Armistice Day since the creation of the memorial, the Municipal chapter of the I. O. O. F. E. of which Mrs. Heber Vroom is regent, has arranged for the brief memorial and decoration service which is to commence at 10:45. This service will not conflict with the annual decoration of the Women's Canadian Club memorial tablet in the post office, which will take place at 10 o'clock.

## THE OUTDOOR CEREMONY.

The outdoor ceremonies in front of the war memorial will consist of a short address and prayer, offered by Rev. C. Gordon Lawrence, overseas chaplain, and the sounding of the Last Post after the two minutes silence period is observed. The singing of the National Anthem will conclude the ceremonies and immediately afterwards wreaths will be placed on the monument. It is hoped that the general public will attend and everyone, who desires, will be given an opportunity of placing memorial flowers.

## COLONEL ANDERSON TO ATTEND

Colonel W. B. Anderson, C.M.G., officer commanding M. D. No. 7, has accepted an invitation to attend the outdoor ceremony with members of the headquarters staff. The Mayor and commissioners have also been invited to attend.

At the preceding ceremony to be held in the post office under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club commencing at 10 o'clock, a half-hour program will be carried out. Addresses will be given by Acting Mayor J. H. Frink and Colonel Anderson and prayer will be offered by Rev. C. J. Markham, who served overseas.

Mrs. Allan Fitz-Randolph, president of the club, and members of the executive, will attend and a cordial invitation has been extended to the public to be present and assist in honoring those who made the supreme sacrifice.

Acting Mayor Frink has asked the New Brunswick Power Company to have their street cars stopped during the two minutes silence period tomorrow.

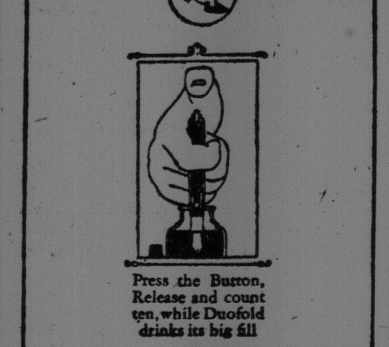
Suppers Held by Several Accredited Good Patronage

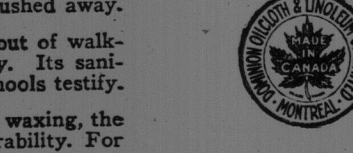
