

Sees New Interest In Study of Latin

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25.—Despite those who insist that Latin is becoming even deadlier than a dead language, there has been an increase of ninety per cent. in enrollment in Latin classes at the University of Pennsylvania, according to Dr. Roland G. Kent, professor of Comparative Philology at the university. Statistics compiled by the United States Bureau of Education show that in the school year of 1922-23 there were 940,000 students of Latin in schools below the rank of colleges and universities, and only 926,000 students of all foreign languages combined, Kent pointed out.
