

HAS EASTER ISLAND GONE

INTO THE DEEP? Paris.
Bishop Blake spoke on the work of Coue at the service this evening in the Chelsea Methodist Episcopal Church. Santiago, Nov. 16—The local newspaper yesterday published a rumor concerning the possibility of the disappearance of Easter Island, lying far out in the Pacific Ocean west of the Coast of the Province of Atacama, during the recent earthquake. The newspaper says the wireless station on the island has failed to answer repeated calls. Official information of any kind regarding the island is lacking.

The island, which is 2,500 miles off the coast, belongs to Chile.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 16—Carl tearns of Boston, for many years a ewsboy, who now is paying his way arough the freshman class at Harvard y selling papers in his spare hours, as been awarded the Boston newsboys' holarship by the Harvard Corpora-

stearns, who is twenty years old, is one of five children of Louis Stearns. a Boston musician. He prepared for Harvard at Boston English High School. During the war he served with the American army in Siberia. He is also an assistant scoutmaster of the Boy Scouts. Stearns intended to earn his entire expenses at college by sellnig papers before he heard of the Boston newsboys' scholarship, founded in 1903 by the Boston Newsboys' Protective Union, "to be awarded, for the student's first year ouly, to that one of the newsboys eligible to compete who passes the Harvard admission examinations with the highest percentage." The scholarship covers the cost of the year's tuition.

CHARGE WAS DISMISSED. Hamilton Boys Were Playing Baseball on Sunday.

Hamilton, Nov. 16. — Magistrate Jelfs expressed himself on the matter of Sunday baseball playing by boys on vacant lots. He sees no wrong in it, and dismissed a disorderly charge igainst half a dozen boys who were caught at a game.

"They'd better be playing ball than shooting craps," said His Worship. "I don't see the harm in it. They go up to the golf links on Sunday."

To the constable who laid the charge he gave instructions that he should bring into court as witnesses citizens who complain of this practice.

NOTED INDIAN CHIEF IS HERE

White Elk on Mission for the Better Education of His People.

Chief White Elk of Vancouver, a traveler and man of very inter rsonality is at the Royal. He is vere in connection with his efforts on behalf of his people and will be in the city for some days. Seen by a Times reporter he said that his mission was

also a member of the Eliss. In one gond tooth is set a diamond made from a stickpin given to him by the Prince of Wales on the occasion of his Canadian teur when he was one of the five Indian chiefs to escort the Prince from Edmonton to the coast. He will speak before the local Rotary Club and will go from here to Newfoundland, sailing for England in January.

He has with him a film in which the cast is composed entirely of Indians, 1,200 in number. The picture was filmed in Yellowstone National Park, and Chief White Elk played the lead as villian. Cheyenne and Crow Indians made up the cast. He is helping the Indians in general, no tribe in particular.

He has with him some very interesting war souvenirs some of which had been sent him from Belgium. There are two scarfs which Belgian children whose fathers and mothers had been killed in the war had worn. In the play "Strongheart" which was staged in Yancouver by the Indians, Chief White Elk played the part of Black Eagle, the messenger. He led the order parade of the International Convention of Kiwanis in Toronto. He has with him a certificate from the Mayor of Nanaimo, B. C., conferring upon him the freedom of the city.

He is making a plea for more efficient schools for the Indians. He gives it as his experience that the guardianship of the Government is a bad thing for some of the Indians, that so long as they know that they will get some money from the Government if they need it, however small, they are robbed of their initiative and many of them become undesirable citizens.

Chief White Elk was shown about the General Public Hospital and the St. John Infirmary by Dr. G. B. Peat and evidenced great interest in what he saw there.
