QUICK GLANCE AT THE MARKETS

(Hardware and Metal; March 12) Chief features in the price changes this week are the further declines in cotton goods such as cash cord, cotton rope, etc. and new lower quotations on bright wire goods.

Manila wrapping paper and kraft have also been reduced in price again. Other declines include files and horse rasps, poultry netting staples, steam cylinder and black oils, oakum and solder. Some lower quotations are made on bar iron and mining tool steel. Quotations have been revised on some lines of pipe fittings and nipples show a decline.

New season's prices have been issued in Paris green and show a small reduction from last year's quotations. Arsenate of lead is slightly higher than last season. Turpentine and linseed oil prices are unchanged from last week and the demand shows improvement.

Pipe is held at quotes noted last week, and there is no change of last on black or galvanized sheets or plates. Ingot metals remain dull, and tin shows a further decline, but lead and spelter are exhibiting a firmer tone. The situation in Europe may have some influence, it is thought on U. S. metals.

Little change is reported in U. S. steel prices during the past week and quotations on bars, shapes, plates and sheets remain practically the same as of the previous week. The chief feature is a cut on wire nails. This is interesting as the regular or Corporation price on these has been regarded as low compared to other steel commodities.

A gradual improvement in business is reported by wholesalers. Shipments of spring goods are going forward, and orders for paint, varnish, and house cleaning needs are increasing in number and volume.

GROCERY REPORTS

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week: During the week under review several heavy transactions in raw sugars have transpired, covering full duty paying sugars such as San Domingos at 45 cents c. l. f. New York, including 2,000 tons for Canadian accounts at top figure, also another lot of 2,000 bags for Canada at 49-16 cents c. l. f. Several large transactions in Cuban at 42-8 cents c. l. f. New York. A parcel of Demerara sugar in store in New York changed hands at 5-77 cents duty paid ex store. Some 5,000 bags of Porto Rico for March shipment were sold. Cuban production to the end of February is 387,000 tons, which is 390,000 tons less than the same period last year.

Canadian refined sugar is holding firm at unchanged prices. One refinery is reported behind in their shipments, which is not running on reduced capacity for some time past.

Canoeed vegetables have a stronger tone and prices have been advanced on many lines. Jams are again reduced in price, and in Toronto there appears to be a lot of price cutting among wholesalers on this line.

Shelled nuts are in a strong position, and with spot stocks very low higher prices can be expected as replacement prices in primary markets have considerably advanced. New crop brazil nuts in the shell are offered at much lower prices than last year.

The tea and coffee markets continue firm and quotations in primary markets are ruling with an upward tendency. Spot stocks are not large, and in fact they are considered to be the lowest on record, prices, however, are generally unchanged to the retail trade, although an upward change in prices, especially on the better grade, can be expected.

Dried fruits are quiet and unchanged. Rice are in good demand since the low level was reached. The primary rice markets show a firmer tendency and it is conceded by those in close touch with the situation that prices have reached the turning point and further changes in prices will tend upward rather than downward.

Cereals and flour are fairly steady under a small demand that is regulated purely by consumption. Potatoes continue to rule easy and lower. Domestic vegetables are slow sellers but imported green vegetables are arriving in heavy shipments in the larger centres, and attractive demand is noted.

3,800 ANIMALS FOR MUSEUM

H. E. Anthony Brings Back Rich Collection From Ecuador. The exhibition rooms of the American Museum of Natural History, New York, and its scientific department will be enriched by 3,800 birds and 1,600 mammals, many of which had never before been represented in the museum, as a result of an eight months' expedition into southern Ecuador by H. E. Anthony, associate curator of mammals at the museum, and George K. Cherie, the naturalist, who accompanied Theodore Roosevelt on his South American expedition in 1914. Besides this collection they have also brought with them an intimate knowledge of the customs and life of the Jivaro Indians, the head hunters, who inhabit the regions east of the Andes near the Peruvian border.

Besides, many specimens of "vampire" bats. Mr. Anthony brought with him the skin of a box constrictor fifteen feet long and a "spectulated" bear.
