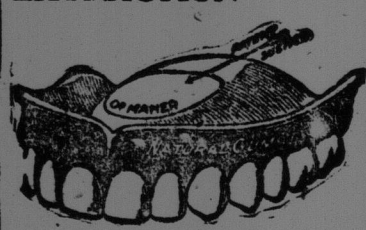
Police Find \$500 Worth of Dope in Artificial Limb

FOUND \$20,000 IN GOLD.

Toronto Police Charge Jewelry Foreman With Theft.

Toronto, April 7.—Samuel Longbottom, 33 Bain avenue, was re-arrested on a charge of theft after Detectives Watkinson and Taylor had recovered \$20,000 worth of pure gold hidden under the verandah of his home. Longbottom was arrested last Saturday charged with theft. He was granted bail of \$10,000. The police claim to have recovered \$38,000 worth of stolen property since Longbottom's arrest. It was stolen from the wholesale jewelry firm of H. Roy & Co. 28 River street. The prisoner was a foreman with the company and was paid \$1 an hour.
