## AGAIN ASK FOR JUVENILE COURT

At the monthly meeting of the Children's Aid Society, last night, a resolution was passed unanimously reaffirming their previous stand in favor of a juvenile court in St. John. The meeting was held in the Children's Home, 68 Garden street, with the president, A. M. Belding, in the chair. The report of the agent, Rev. George Scott, covered three weeks from the time of the last meeting, October 21. In that time he had written and sent forty letters and post cards and made forty-one visits. One family had been helped and warm clothing and boots provided for the little ones. Two families who had been reported by the police as being destitute were visited several times and their cases investigated. They were able to place their children with relatives till they could pull themselves together again. Particulars were given of a sad case in which action will have to be taken. At the request of the Children's Aid Society in Fredericton the condition of a family in Chapel street was investigated. There were several other cases in which the advice of the agent was sought. Seven children have been taken out of the home, one of them going to the Wiggins Male Orphanage, leaving twenty-one now within the walls.

## REPRESENTATION OF GREAT BRITAIN AT THE VATICAN

## MRS. BLACKADDER WAS ASPHYXIATED BENEATH CAR

London, Nov. 11.—A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest into the death of Mrs. Kathleen Blackadder, former fiancée of Colonel Hamilton Gault, former commander of the Princess Patricia's Battalion, Colonel Gault, who was driving the car at the time of the accident, said that it overturned and that Mrs. Blackadder was asphyxiated beneath it.

## FOUNDER'S DAY AT MOUNT ALLISON

Sackville, N. B., Nov. 11.—Founder's day was observed at Mount Allison University here. Service was held in the Charles Fawcett Memorial Hall, at which Justice Russell, of Halifax, gave an address, praising the founders of the institution. An Armistice day celebration, in memory of the students who fell in the war, was held in the evening in the Methodist church. H. B. Clark, of St. John, gave an address. Plans for the half million dollar campaign were discussed at a banquet held at 8.30 in the evening in the university residence. Short addresses were given by the publicity manager and others.

## Strongly Urge Higher Bridge at Reversing Falls

Following is the full text of the letter sent to the common council regarding the railway bridge at the Reversing Falls, and the names of those who signed it: St. John, N. B., November, 1920. To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the Common Council, St. John, N. B.

Dear Sirs:—In the matter of the new bridge, now under construction, we, the undersigned, who are very much interested in the use of the Reversing Falls, be called, beg leave to state our opinion regarding the height we feel it should be from the water at slack flood tide, when vessels are passing through the Falls. In the first place we wish to call your attention to the fact that the trade for which the vessels are now used in the coastwise business has changed greatly within the last few years. The class of vessels formerly used has become almost obsolete, larger ones having taken their place, consequently having much longer spars. As this new railway bridge will probably be a permanent fixture for a good many years, we feel that now is the time for it to be put high enough to compare favorably with the present new passenger bridge, or at least say ninety feet clear of the water at the proper time for vessels to pass up through the falls, say at summer level.

We would also urge the putting up of the bridge at this time, as by doing so the approach to the passenger bridge can be made safer by having a viaduct instead of a level crossing, which would be cheaper than an overhead approach. We are under the impression that the C. P. R. would be reasonable and willing to spend money to meet a reasonable demand, or to say the least, to remedy any obstruction to navigable waters to the detriment of those who are compelled to use them. Another matter we would call your attention to is the new buttment erected on the west side of the Falls. This is a permanent obstruction to navigation, inasmuch as it has changed the course of the current and tugboat captains say that if it remains where it is it will be necessary to remove Spill Rock. We therefore trust that your honorable body will take such steps as you feel the emergency needs to have the bridge raised to a height safe to protect the waterway as above set out.

## URGE GENERAL REDUCTION IN THE TARIFF

Quebec, Nov. 11.—Urging a general reduction in the tariff on all articles required for the cultivation of the soil and for the support of the family, farmers of the province of Quebec and their representatives were given a hearing by the tariff commission here this afternoon. The entire afternoon sitting was devoted to hearing the representatives of the farming classes and at 5 o'clock the commission was adjourned until tomorrow.

## SUGAR PRICES.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—There was no change in refined prices for sugar today, although it was freely predicted that the Dominion Sugar Company would soon be selling at twelve cents, less five per cent or 11.40 net. A feature of interest to consumers will be the appearance of a half page advertisement in the Montreal Gazette from the Acadia Sugar Refineries of Montreal and Halifax, warning consumers that the price of sugar to them on Friday, November 12, will be fifteen cents and that at intervals after that date notification through the public press will be given of what the price of sugar to the consumer who buys from grocers obtaining their supplies through this refinery should be.

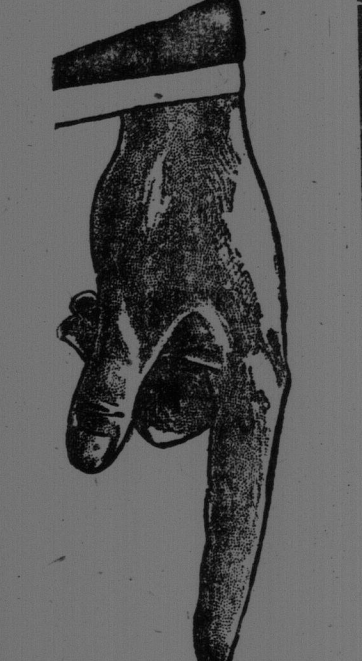
