
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## City League

## MOTOR BOAT

## A Lengthy Race.

San Francisco, April 8.—Motor boats will race over the longest course ever laid for craft of their class when they start from New York by way of the Panama and win \$10,000 in prizes, the authorization of which is announced by the Panama-Pacific Exposition. The start of the race will be arranged so that the finish will be at the exposition grounds when the motor boat regatta, to be held in October, is in progress.


The boats entering the contest must have a minimum length of sixty-five feet on the water line. The United States authorities have been asked to co-operate by detailing two or three destroyers or revenue cutters to follow the racers on the Atlantic and Pacific coasts to lend assistance to any disabled craft and assure security to the contestants.

The contest will be under the management of the American Power Boat Association.

## GOLF

Outside Men Arriving.

"I think this time I shall have the best boat that I ever crossed the Atlantic with and I think my chances this year are on the winning side."


BASEBALL
