Montreal Matters

Montreal, June 22.—The annual report of Ames-Holmes-McCready, Ltd., for the year ended April 30, mailed to shareholders on Saturday bears out closely the forecast given in the Gazette some two weeks ago, showing a falling off in both gross and business and net profits, but a materially improved position in the matter of sharp reductions in current indebtedness. Net sales for the year amounted to \$4,702,000, against \$4,700,000 the previous year, a shrinkage of approximately 10 per cent. Net profits are given as \$807,098, against \$851,260 the previous year, but as the sinking fund charges of \$50,000 were deducted before reaching forward profits this year, not as in 1913, the actual difference in net was only \$23,792, or about 7 per cent. Indications seem to point to a continuance of the present inactive market. The market shows strength, and any buying power affects prices easily. Would buy the market on any soft spots.

WANT A CHANGE IN THE SYSTEM OF HOUSE RENTAL IN MONTREAL.
 Montreal, June 22.—With a view to doing away with the present system of yearly leases, by which three bands of citizens are compelled to move every May day, the Montreal Tenants Protective Association has obtained 30,000 signatures to a petition to the Quebec government for a change of the system. It is said that 75,000 names to the petition will be secured by the time the legislature meets.

BODY FOUND

NEAR MUSQUASH

Believed to Be That of Dennis Morris, Lumberman, Missing Since February

Ralph G. Day and his brother, Charles Day, of this city, made a gruesome discovery near Musquash while fishing on Saturday, when they came across the badly decomposed body of a man, supposed to be Dennis Morris, a lumberman, who has been missing since last February.

The brothers, accompanied by Mrs. Charles Day, were fishing along the banks of Bonny Dore, which empties into the Musquash River. They found the body in a clump of bushes. Fred Clinch, a cruiser, was notified, and said he would notify the coroner.

Morris left Gregory's lumber camp at Musquash in February, and nothing had been heard of him since, but a visitor to the city from Musquash this morning said that it was quite certain that the body found was that of the missing man.
