Cross-Firing, By Counsel in The Steamship Dispute Today

The case of the St. John River Steamship Company vs. The Crystal Steamship Company and Mr. D. Austin was continued before Mr. Justice Landry in chambers this morning. The only witness on the stand was Captain Altheil, agent for the plaintiff company at Inverness. He was subjected to a cross-examination by Recorder Baxter on an affidavit he made in connection with the case.

EXTRA CLERKS ON

Mail Staff Being Increased in Preparation for Christmas Rush

In anticipation of the increased amount of mail to be handled during the holiday season, A. J. 
