Shaw Is Given Release

Pittsburgh, April 10.—James Shaw of Pittsburgh and former pitcher of the Washington baseball club, has received his unconditional release from the Minneapolis club of the American Association and has asked for a try-out with the Pittsburgh Pirates. Shaw was sent to Minneapolis last summer after an injured right knee did not respond readily to treatment. He spent the winter here with relatives.

Denied Recognition

Albany, N. Y., April 10.—The refusal of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues to recognize the newly formed Atlantic League, composed of clubs located at Allentown, Lancaster, Bethlehem, Pottsville, Pa., Wilmington, Trenton and Middletown, has resulted in many players' complications. It was said by Secretary John H. Farrell.

Players signing up may lose their

standing in minor league baseball, Mr. Farrell said. "Recognition and affiliation have been denied the Atlantic League by the National Board, there will be no affiliation granted for any player under that title in the 1923 playing season."

Exhibition games of two or three

clubs will be approved with the Atlantic League club, provided they associate themselves from ineligible players," he added.

Tigers Are Batting Hard

Detroit, April 10.—Ty Cobb's Tigers, known throughout the American League as hard hitters, have established some remarkable batting averages in the early season practice games, which include a series with the Rochester and Augusta clubs. Another .300 per cent. batting line apparently is in prospect for the coming season.

Derrill Pratt tops the average

column with .314 per cent. for nine games. Pothergill, Kerr and Hanger are tied at .300. Cobb has batted .285 in nine games. Other averages are: Woodall, .430; Basler, .400; Rigney, .390; Jones, .348; and Blue, .321.

Harry Hellman, one of the best

baseball players, apparently has not started his season's slugging, his average being .261.

GIBBONS DECIDES

TO BOX RENAULT

If He Decisively Wins Bout

Early in May He Will

Jack Dempsey.

New York, April 10.—Tom Gibbons

has decided to accept the opportunity afforded by the recent ruling of the New York State Athletic Commission that should he decisively defeat Jack Renault, he would be permitted to fight Jack Dempsey for the world's heavyweight championship in this State, and that he has agreed to box the Canadian heavyweight at the Yankee Stadium on May 8 or May 11. This was disclosed yesterday when Tex Rickard, on his first day in business since his recent hunting trip, announced that after a conference with Leo Flynn, manager of Renault, Flynn had signed articles for the bout. Gibbons has been clamoring for a chance to meet Jack Dempsey for some time. He has claimed persistently that he is in line to fight the champion for the world's title. It seems that as soon as the St. Paul boxer learned that he could fight Dempsey providing he decisively defeated Renault he proceeded to negotiate for a match with Dempsey's former sparring partner. Should Renault succeed in defeating Gibbons, Rickard announced that he

will try to match Dempsey with

Renault.

Word was received in this city yesterday that Johnny Kilbane, who is scheduled to box Eugent Crqui at the Polo Grounds in June for the featherweight championship of the world, has arranged to leave Cleveland within a week to appear before the New York State Athletic Commission and apply for a license to box in this State. The message stated that Kilbane is in good condition at this time and that it will not take him long to get in the best of shape to meet the French champion of Europe.
