DEATH DUE TO NATURAL CAUSES

Verdict That Wm. Geddes Die
of Congestion of the Lungs
and Heart Failure

From Saturday's Daily

No evidence of a new or startling nature was brought to light at the inquest last night touching the death of the late Wm. Geddes, found dead Wednesday night at Tule's boarding house. There had been some sensational rumors, and it was largely on the strength of these, as explained by Coroner Coleridge, that it was decided to hold the inquest. Statements were made to the Coroner by Joe Jones, and, as a result, it was thought best to hold the investigation. When called last night Jones stated that owing to his condition at the time, he was not prepared to swear to what he had previously stated.

After deliberating for a very short time the jury returned a verdict to the effect that Geddes died of natural causes, congestion of the lungs and heart failure.

Mr. Geo. Tane, proprietor of the boarding house stated that Geddes had been drinking quite heavily for about two weeks. He was not aware of Geddes having been ill otherwise. He last saw him alive between 11 and 12 o'clock Tuesday night, when he was going to his room. During the following day his attention was drawn to the possibility of something being wrong, by Geo. Alcock, one of the boarders, who had stated that he could not get a response from Geddes' room, when he called to him and rapped on his door. In the evening the door to the room was forced, when Geddes was found dead on the bed.

Dr. Neff, who made the post-mortem examination stated there were no marks of violence, except a few abrasions. The abrasion over the left eye would not have caused death. The lungs were congested, both being probably in the first stage of pneumonia. From the condition of the lungs and clots of blood found in the cavities of the heart, he was of the opinion that the deceased came to his death from natural causes, congestion of the lungs and heart failure.

John Moon, a young man, testified that he saw Geddes about 11 o'clock Tuesday night. He went to his room with him and saw there two whiskey bottles, one of which contained a quantity of whiskey. He would not

believe any evidence to the effect that anyone saw Geddes alive after he (witness) left the room. He had turned down the lamp for Geddes, who had locked the door after he left. The lamp was still turned down and burning the next night when the body was found.

Joe Jones was next called but after hearing his explanation in regard to some of the ugly rumors, the Coroner decided not to take any further evidence, at the same time pointing out that the investigation had been deemed necessary in order to clear up the rumors that had been afloat.

Mr. J. G. Gibson appeared at the inquest on behalf of the estate and the relatives of the deceased.

CHARACTER SKETCHES

No doubt there are many of us who still miss the late Peter Kennedy. To meet him on the street and pass the time of day with him was ever a forcible reminder that you had met a whole soul man whose pleasant "good day" and perhaps hearty hand shake made you feel that this world is not such a bad place to live in after all.

He was a man of many impulses. He could warm up to a subject in short order and in the briefest possible manner, could tell you what he thought both of you and the theme under discussion.

If the subject matter took hold of him, you would very likely hear some plain Saxon terms, not always found in the Ten Commandments, the atmosphere would be anything but chilly and he might direct you to a road that lead to a much warmer climate, in fact he would raise the steam pressure from ten to fifty pounds to the square inch in an incredible short space of time, but when you met him the next day he would greet you with all the geniality of a warm-hearted Irishman.

He was a devoted advocate of Home Rule for Ireland, and many a time he has dropped into my office to show me some newspaper article dealing with the subject that lay so near to his heart. A few weeks before his death, and I think the last time he favored me with a visit, his heart still beat in sympathy with his native land. I remember that I opened out my own mind to him, as I told him that at the last session of the Imperial Parliament over four hundred bills never reached a stage beyond the Notice Paper, showing that Parliament was quite unable to grapple successfully with such a vast number of bills, many of which were purely of a local character, and that Local Parliaments for England, Ireland, Scotland and perhaps Wales was the only remedy. I shall never forget how he looked at me. His eyes sparkled. He walked up and down my office as if his soul was stirred to its uttermost depths, and then gathering himself together, he said "Gibson, I would like to live to see the day when some such measure of justice shall be dealt out to my suffering country." Yes, Peter Kennedy, we miss you. He was not wanting in his intellectual make up, but it was the soul power of the warm-hearted and impulsive Irishman that drew all men to him.

I never asked him to lend a helping hand in behalf of some needy one, that he ever refused and he would hand

out his contributions with such a generous hand as to lead you to think that there are some things in humanity that seem to have escaped the curse of the fall of Adam and the race after him.

In business life he was a bundle of activity. His word was as good as his bond. He was one of my best friends and the fact that he was a Reformer while I was a Conservative never affected the happy relationship that for well nigh fifty years existed between us.

THE LATE CANON HINCKES

To the Editor of The Chronicle.

Dear Sir:—While I have been indulging in a reminiscent mood, suddenly, like a bolt out of a clear sky the news is flashed over the wire from Bracebridge that Canon Hinckes has passed away to his long home.

Only a few days ago he left his Ingersoll home along with his wife and youngest daughter Alice, to go to the northern town to spend the holiday season with his son, who is the Anglican clergyman at that place. It seems well nigh impossible to think that he has passed to the Great Beyond.

It must be over fifty years since I first knew him. He was then in the very prime of his manhood. His tall, erect figure and elastic step would attract the attention of the most casual observer. His every movement was at once an indication that he was a bundle of energy.

Now and then I used to attend the old historic church in which I was confirmed when a lad in the Old Country. The beautiful service never seemed to lag or grow monotonous under his skillful rendition. How often I have heard people remark, "Does he not read with remarkable expression and power?"

He was a princely preacher, and he preached a simple but soul-stirring gospel. He never indulged in the sensational rant that is too often indulged in in our day. He told the story of the cross in simple language, which, after all, will alone satisfy the longing of the human heart and redeem this old world of ours from the awful effects of sin. He always enjoyed in a very eminent degree the confidence of his people, yea, more, his pure life and conduct were powerful factors in influencing the whole community.

After leaving Ingersoll, very much to the regret of all concerned, he served his Master in Galt, Windsor and Port Stanley, and finally returned to our town as the one spot in which to end his days. For the past five years he has been my next door neighbor. Our gardens join each other, and yet we have no fence between us, so that we have passed to each other's home with every possible freedom, from which it will be seen, that I have had very many opportunities of coming in contact with him. He was a model neighbor. He was kindness in action and under all circumstances he acted the part of a christian gentleman. He was very regular and methodical in his habits of life. You could just about tell the time of day when he would carry out the ashes from the furnace. Then shortly after he would walk away with a brisk step to the post office to get his mail. His home

abounded with good books and ancient MSS along with many a curio which he had gathered together during his long and busy life. Up to the last he was a great reader, in fact he allowed no day to go by without adding to his stock of knowledge.

He came from an illustrious line of ancestry, the late Sir Francis Hincks being a near relative. What a blank he will leave in the lives of many of us who, for half a century have enjoyed his delightful fellowship, and yet he will still continue to live to inspire us to do our duty in our day and generation.

To his beloved and faithful wife and sorrowing children I am sure we all will tender our heartfelt sympathy and may we all unite our humble petitions to the throne of grace, that He who has promised to be a father to the fatherless and a husband to the widow will lend to them that consolation which He alone can bestow.

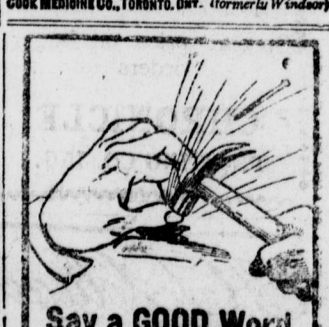
