

THIRD WITNESS FOR the prosecution

One of the Canadian soldiers then said "The" began break everything." After this the English soldiers had understood slightly what the man had said. The conversation stopped until the Canadian soldier went to the kitchen to clean some glasses where the proprietress asked to tell me that Soper had gone to fetch counter and the third in front of the door. The Canadian soldiers asked for money and since I then was not yet coming I suggested to the police to fetch the police myself, which I did. When I came back noticed that four tables vases and glasses were broken. That is all I know, I three
