FIRST EDITION. JUDGE PALMER ACTS.

ANOTHER PHASE IN THE COTTON MILL CASE DEVELOPED TODAY. An Injunction to Compel the Bank of Montreal to Refrain from Advancing Money to the Receiver of Parks and Son (Limited).

The morning His Honor Mr. Justice Palmer, judge in equity, in re Waldon, et al vs Parks & Son (limited) et al, on application of Mr. L.A. Curry, who filed the affidavit of Mr. John H. Parks, granted an injunction restraining the Bank of Montreal or any one on its behalf from advancing money to the receiver of Parks & Son (limited) et al, or from commencing and prosecuting any proceedings against the receiver with respect to the matters involved in the full discharge of his duties as such receiver.

The following is the affidavit upon which the order was made: In the Supreme court in equity—Charles H. Waldon, et al plaintiffs and Parks & Son (limited) et al defendants. J. John H. Parks, of the city of Saint John in the county of Saint John, cotton manufacturer, make oath and say: 1. That I am the president and manager of the said defendant company, William Parks & Son (limited), and have a personal knowledge of the facts and circumstances hereinafter deposed to.

2. That on the twenty-second day of August last upon application of the plaintiffs, and with the consent of the defendants herein His Honor Mr. Justice Palmer, judge in equity did order that Hugh H. McLean, receiver in equity in application of Mr. L.A. Curry, et al, should receive and take possession of the cotton factories then operated by the said defendant, William Parks & Son (limited) together with all the stock in trade then manufactured and unmanufactured in the said factories, together with all the property and effects of the said company together with the debts due to said company and to hold, use and dispose of the same under the order and direction of the honorable court to be made from time to time herein and to do all such things as the court should direct in the premises.

3. That under, by virtue and in pursuance of said appointment, orders and directions, said receiver did enter into possession of said property and did undertake and enter upon the discharge of the duties imposed upon him as such receiver in and to hold, use and dispose of the same under the order and direction of the honorable court to be made from time to time herein and to do all such things as the court should direct in the premises.

4. That in pursuance of said appointment, orders and directions, said receiver did enter into possession of said property and did undertake and enter upon the discharge of the duties imposed upon him as such receiver in and to hold, use and dispose of the same under the order and direction of the honorable court to be made from time to time herein and to do all such things as the court should direct in the premises.

5. That on or about the twentieth day of April just past and during the pendency of this suit and while acting under said appointment and arrangement said receiver was being operated by the receiver and under the directions of the court and facilities for labor and raw materials were outstanding and before amounts due on sales were collected by said receiver the said Bank of Montreal contrary to said injunction advanced and loaned to said receiver the sum of \$40,000, and said receiver did not disclose the same to the court.

6. That on or about the twentieth day of April instant said Bank of Montreal gave a notice to the parties to whom the receiver had made and was making sales of said manufactured goods a copy of which said notice is hereto annexed and marked "A" and did also give such notification to other banking institutions as was calculated to and did prevent them from making advances and discounts for said receiver and did otherwise disturb and interfere with said receiver in negotiating or dealing with said banks.

MARY MURPHY THE VICTIM OF A CRIMINAL OPERATION. Dr. Henry M. Leach of Somerville, in whose family she was employed, in custody for the crime—has been found guilty of a crime of a heinous nature, and has been sentenced to the penitentiary for life.

Mary Murphy of Somerville, a hard-working domestic, but 19 years of age, died in the home of her sister, Mrs. Mahoney, at No. 35 Meridian street, a victim of criminal malpractice. At the Somerville police station on a copy of one of the pills of Dr. Henry M. Leach, who was arrested yesterday afternoon, charged with performing the operation which caused her death.

Mary had two brothers and two sisters living in Somerville, and was in the habit of visiting them at regular intervals. She had Thursday afternoon out and usually visited her sister, Mrs. Mahoney, on that day. Last Thursday she did not appear, and on Saturday one of her sisters called at the home of Dr. Leach. She was told by Dr. Leach that he had been to see her sister, but that her sister was dead.

Medical Examiner Durell, who will be the most important witness in the case and whose information to the police brought about the arrest of Dr. Leach, said last evening to Herald reporter that he recalled afternoon about 6 o'clock Dr. Leach called on him and requested that he come to his house to see the body of the girl. He explained that the girl had been troubled with "La Grippe" and had died in the morning of the 23rd of April. Dr. Leach's house, he found that the girl was dead. Her body was warm, and the doctor knew more than he had told about it.

Dr. Durell, in his capacity of medical examiner, made an autopsy and found that a bluing operation had been performed, which set up peritonitis and soon caused death. Dr. Durell said he was the most clumsy piece of work he had ever seen. He said that he had seen some queer stories about Dr. Leach—the girl's mother, he said, had been told that she was dead, and that she was something wrong in the death, and that the doctor knew more than he had told about it.

LABOUCQUE ON TRIAL. Accidental Reversal of a Jailor's Death-Sentence. L'ONTOUR, April 28.—The trial of Narcisse Laboucq for the outrage and murder of Marie and Felix McCool, aged 12 and 14, last, was held last night. It took four hours to empanel the jury. The Crown objecting to all but two Frenchmen, and defence objecting to all but two Englishmen, the jury was empaneled.
