

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE W. C. T. U.

Meetings Will Be Held at New Westminster This Month—Programme Arranged

New Westminster, June 10.—The twenty-seventh annual convention of the British Columbia Women's Christian Temperance Union will be held on June 21st, 22nd and 23rd in Queen's Avenue Methodist church.

This provincial organization has grown since it was first planted in Victoria in 1884, the second in New Westminster in 1886. For many years these two cities have retained the conventions alternately until Vancouver city was of sufficient importance to claim its share of the privilege.

The year New Westminster again extends an invitation and the call has gone out to all sections of the province where unions exist. Since last June six new unions have been organized, viz.: Golden, Creston, Keremeos, Fernie, Coquitlam and South Wellington.

The convention will open to the public Sunday night, June 13th, at the close of the church services, with a grand rally meeting in the opera house with music and addresses.

Tuesday afternoon a welcome garden party will be given at the residence of George Adams, Twelfth street, by the local union to the visitors.
