When Mr. Came purchased the property from James Mowatt a year ago he had in view the establishment of a stock farm, for the breading of hackney horses. Since then his views have been enlarged to include a creamery of the two interests are now being pursued with great vigor.

In the horse stable is a magnificent hackney stallion and several very handsome brood mares. In all there are nine horses. Some of these, of course, are work horses for the farm. The dairy industry is probably the most important in connection with the farm, and at the present time, for obvious reasons, is receiving the most attention. A creamery building, 34x50 feet, has been erected a little to the morth of the dwelling and almost opposite the church. The building, which was constructed under the direction of Wright McLaren, is well equipped for carrying on the manufacture of butter, it will be operated by a 12 horse power engine. The squipment embraces a large revolving chara, capable of turning out 300 lbs. of butter, a separator, vais for milk and cream, and all the other accessories. There are cooling cooms; and rooms for washing, bottling, packing, etc., also an ice closet. To keep the creamery running, Mr. Came has interested the farmers within a radius of twenty miles, and he expects to draw a large milk supply from this source. But he will not depend wholly upon his neighbors, for he she made arrangements for keeping a large dairy herd himself. The nucleus of this hard, which embraces some fine Holstein and Jersey cattle—several of them prize-winners—is now in his barn. He has probably twenty-five head of cattle in the stalls now. Another car-load of twenty or more is expected to arrive in a few days. To accommodate this large herd, a barn, 100 feet in length, will be built a shor
