



**NEEDS RELIGION** 

Secretary Haldane Asks for Greater Interest in the Army.

For all Time-expired Men-Other Improvements Talked About.

LONDON, July 12.-War Secretary Haldane, in opening the new portion o the soldiers' and sailors' home at Pimlico last night, said unless the people work for the welfare of the soldier outside his bare profession, they would They could not induce men to give the country their best unless they were prepared to hold out some prospect of care and help, due those willing to lay For some time he said, a war offic ommittee had been laboring on plan ong these lines and for the cotion of existing agencies with For many years we have peen giving this branch of our business agreat deal of thought tion, as are all men; but the safeguard was the consciousness that man is as necessary to God, as God is to him. Mr. Haldane said he felt strongly that the care of the spiritual needs of the army should be placed in a comprehensive footing. He had been trying to devise a new element in the war office organization for increasing the breadth and reality of the foundation office organization for increasing the breadth and reality of the foundation on which this matter should be dealt with. He said the army council had decided to appoint a committee as part of the regular army organization, charged with looking after the spiritual needs of the soldiers on a borad and comprehensive basis. All churches would be represented on this committee and it would also include distinguished laymen who appreciated these matters.

### REPAIRING LEAKS IN THE PARTRIDGE ISLAND LINE.

Weeks and Has Had Good

For the past three or four weeks Diver Edward Leahy has been going over the pipe which was laid from Fort Dufferin to Partridge Island, tightening the joints and endeavoring to stop the leaks. This pipe, which is wrought iron and fitted with ball and socket joints, was laid last winter for the purpose of supplying Partridge Is land with water. The metre showed shortly afterwards that there was a leakage through the joints of about a leakage through the joints of about a thousand gallons an hour, and Mr. Leahy was engaged to tighten these joints. He has been going down almost every day lately, and so far has succeeded in reducing the leakage from 1000 to 180 gallons an hour.
