QUESTION OF FERRY RATES AGAIN BEFORE COMMISSION

West End Firms Using Ferry Extensively Apply for
Reduction in Rate of Team Tickets--Meanwhile
Overdraft is Authorized for Ferry Expenses --
Other Matters Discussed by Council Yesterday

At its meeting yesterday the common council authorized another overdraft to the amount of \$5,000 for the ferry service, and W. B. Scully and H. Colby Smith representing the larger users of the ferry appeared and asked for a reduction of the tolls on teams. A delegation from the Board of Trade, consisting of H. C. Schofield, W. C. Allison and R. H. Bruce, requested the commissioners to extend a formal welcome to the distinguished visitors expected here on July 11. It was decided to pay the city laborers by check. A good deal of routine business was dealt with.

Civic Welcome Asked.

Before the council convened, President Schofield of the Board of Trade was heard. He said that in connection with the opening ceremonies of the Courtenay Bay work a number of cabinet ministers and officials from Ottawa and also members of the local government and the Lieut. Governor had been invited here and it was the intention to give them a banquet on Thursday evening and to entertain them at a garden party on W. F. Burditt's grounds in the afternoon. He suggested that the city authorities make arrangements to give the party a luncheon and formal civic welcome. Com. Schofield suggested that it might be preferable to entertain the guests at the Golf Club.

The commissioners said they favored the principle of the request, and would give the matter serious consideration.

The council was then called to order. Accounts to the extent of \$31,686.23 paid since the last monthly report, were passed.

Financial Matters.

The report of the commissioner of finance recommended that in future the city laborers be paid by check by a clerk from the municipality office and superintendents in charge of the workmen. This was adopted. Com. McNeilan dissenting and saying the change would lead to trouble.

The next recommendation was that the controller be authorized to make additional advances up to \$5,000 for expenditure on the ferry service if necessary.

Com. Schofield said the expenditure of the ferry for the first six months of this year was \$3,000 higher than in any similar period in the past, and the difference would not stop as they would have to go on with absolutely necessary work. Two weeks ago a special grant of \$1,125 was made.

Water and Sewerage.

The commissioner of water and sewerage reported that the order of council of the 23rd day of May last, accepting the tender of George Dick to supply 40 tons of run of mine Grand Lake coal, thereto, and that the Chamberlain return him the proportion of the amount of the tender of R. P. & W. F. Starr to supply R. of M. Reservoir coal, \$3.50 per ton, was accepted.

The following tender was accepted, namely: Tobias & Parris, Excavation for water main, Milford Road: Rock \$3.75; earth, 65 cents per lineal foot.

Tobias & Parris, Excavation for sewer, Saint John street, West: rock, \$3.75; earth, 70 cents per lineal foot.

The tender of William Kane from the City at \$13.10 per ton for iron, and \$7.75 per 100 pounds for brass be accepted.

The action of your commissioner in having a telephone placed at the residence of the superintendent of streets be confirmed.

Harbors, Ferries and Land.

The commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands recommended: That the Chamberlain be authorized to write off the following rentals on lots at Blue Rock, St. John West, recently conveyed to the Canadian S. Hoyt Heatthey, 6 months to 1st May, of Lot 1099, \$3.00

1st May, of Lot 1,100, \$2.00

1st May, of Lot 1,102, \$3.38

1st May, of Lot 1,104, \$2.00

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Referred back.

That if the Canadian Pacific Railway Company change the lights in warehouses Nos. 1, 2 and 3, St. John West, as authorized by the Common Council on the 6th day of February, 1911, the city will reimburse it the cost thereof in case it does not allow it to use the said sheds. Adopted.

The following tenders for coal for the ferry service be accepted, namely:

George Dick, 45 tons American anthracite at \$7.15 per ton; R. P. & W. F. Starr Ltd., 20 tons anthracite at \$7.50 per ton. Adopted.

That renewal lease issue to Rob Jennings of lot 693 Brooks Ward for 7 years from 1st November, 1908, upon the Common Clerk being satisfied that he is entitled to the same. Adopted.

That renewal lease issue to James McDonald of lot 523, Brooks Ward, for 7 years from 1st May last upon the Common Clerk being satisfied that he is entitled to the same. Adopted.

The offer of \$600 by the Fawcett Milling Company for the fee simple in lot 351 Prince Ward, be not accepted, but that renewal lease be granted them from 1st May, 1911, upon the Common Clerk being satisfied that they are entitled to the same. Adopted.

That the offer of \$800 made by William Fox for two lots on Main street, Fairville, be not accepted, and that the lease, which expired 1st May last, be renewed for a further term of 7 years. Adopted.

I. C. R. Permission Revoked.

That the order of council of the 6th day of November last, granting permission to the I. C. Railway to lay a spur track along the eastern side of the warehouse extending northward from Reed's Point, be cancelled and annulled, and that the order of Common Council of the 16th day of May last, with reference to the same, be confirmed.

The order of the council of the 23rd day of May last, refusing to accept the tender of J. S. Gregory of \$1,125 for supplying spilling for the ferry service be reconsidered and the tender be not accepted. Adopted.

Another section of the report recommended the appointment of arbitrators to determine whether the city or C. P. R. should pay the cost of the repairs to the bridge which was damaged last winter by the Empress of Britain.

The mayor--The liability is a matter for law. Why should it be arbitrated? Com. Schofield thought it would be cheaper to arbitrate than to take the matter to the courts.

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THE CITY WILL BE ABLAZE WITH BUNTING NEXT WEEK

Decorative Scheme will be on Especially Elaborate Scale--Complete Programme for Old Home Week as Arranged to Date--Special Feature for Every Day of the Week.

That those who visit St. John for Old Home Week will have the time of their lives is assured, as a bright and entertaining programme for each day has been prepared. This programme embraces everything along the museum line, from street parades to the most popular sight in town.

The city will be gaily decorated for the occasion with flags and bunting and will present a festive and gala appearance.

Beautiful Decorations.

Starting at Douglas Avenue, Main street will be decorated down to Mill from there the flags and bunting will lead up Mill street to Dock and to Market Square. When finished Market Square will be one of the sights of the city as it will be trimmed to the limit. Going up King street the decorations will go around King Square which is expected to look exceptionally well. Charlotte street will also come in for its share of flags and bunting as it will be trimmed from Linton to Princess.

On Prince William street the display will be brilliant and will stretch from the foot of King street to the Eastern Steamship Company's wharf at Reid's Point. Market Square on the west side will also be decorated.

In addition to this and what will add to the gala appearance of the city the different merchants will trim their stores while many of the private residences will be decorated.

Another move toward giving a holiday appearance to the city is the effort being made to have all the lights in every house and store lighted from early in the evening to late at night.

Noted Band Coming.

Among the outside attractions for the week will be the Cambridge City Band. This band consists of 25 pieces of the most modern instruments.

The Cambridge City Band jumped into fame recently when it won the competition for professional bands in the United States.

The band will arrive on Monday and will be heard in St. Andrew's rink on Saturday evening. They will also give band concerts in the rink on Wednesday and Friday evenings.

Another outside attraction is "Colonel" Frances Ferris's world famous shows.

This show while partaking of the nature of a circus consists of ten different acts, all of which will prove interesting. These shows will arrive here on Sunday evening and will set up on the barrack green where they will be opened to the public on Monday.

The Programme.

On Tuesday evening the official opening of the celebration will be held when the mayor and commissioners will give a reception at the Union Club. During the day all the incoming trains and boats will be met by bands.

On Wednesday morning the visitors will be given a street car ride around the city, while during the afternoon a concert will be given at Rockwood Park and the horse races at Moosepath will prove a big attraction.

In the evening the High School Alumni will give a reception to the visiting graduates, and nine firms at present purchasing more than 1,000 tickets a year. The loss to the city revenues would be \$1,400 if the team rates were reduced from 8 cents to a 6 cent basis.

In view of the need of an overdraft to reduce the tolls just as soon as conditions warranted them in doing so. The commissioner promised to give the request full consideration and went into private session.
