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'JINX' FOLLOWS EXPEDITION TO NORTHEAST

Boat Which Went To Re-
lief of Explorer's Party
Sinks—No Trace Yet of
Schroeder Stranz.

Christiania, Norway, Aug. 6.—A further mishap in connection with the ill-fated Schroeder-Stranz Arctic expedition was reported in a telegram which reached here today announcing the sinking of the cutter Loevenekjold, which set out to the relief of Lt. Schroeder-Stranz and his party, many of whom disappeared in Spitzbergen and some of whom are known to have perished.

The members of the relief expedition on board the Loevenekjold, commanded by Capt. Lerner, and comprising five German explorers and a crew of eight sailors, are continuing the search in the ship's small boats and on sleds. They have hitherto found no traces of the missing explorer or his companions.

Capt. Staxrud, the Norwegian leader of the other relief expedition, sent a wireless despatch to the foreign office here yesterday, also reporting that he had no traces of Schroeder-Stranz in northeast land. He said he was about to proceed across the ice and the land from William Island to Green Bay.

La. Schroeder-Stranz with three companions left the other members of his party last year to make a practice trip on sledges across northeast land, and they have not been heard from since.

The object of the Schroeder-Stranz expedition was to try to discover a northeast passage. None of the eleven Germans and five Norwegians comprising the party had had any arctic experience.

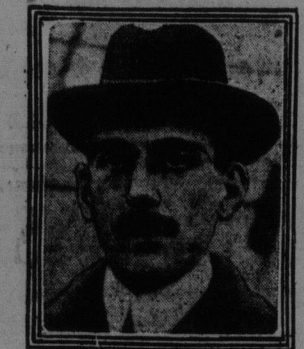

GERMANY PLANS NEW SQUADRON

Montreal, Aug. 6.—A special London cable to the Star says: "Berlin telegrams announce the creation of a contemplated special cruiser squadron which will be always available for the protection of imperilled German interests abroad. This looks as if the German government is about to enter a new phase of their naval policy, as for many decades practically all the German fleet have been concentrated in the Baltic and then overflowed into the North Sea."

The Daily Telegraph says that this report will only serve to emphasize the importance of Mr. Churchill's scheme for establishing an imperial patrol with the aid of the various Dominions. The Daily Telegraph adds: "Unfortunately at the moment when Germany is taking action to show her flag on the distant seas in a powerful squadron, the British scheme is temporarily endangered by the adverse vote of the Canadian Senate."

The New Brunswick delegates to the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, held in St. John's, Newfoundland, including W. B. Wallace and Robert Maxwell, of St. John; P. A. Guthrie, of Fredericton, and H. C. Wadman, J. A. Clarke and R. H. Geddis, of Moncton, have returned home. Delegates are loud in their praise of the manner in which they were entertained. Some of them stated that they never have been entertained with so lavish a hand as by the men of St. John's. It is the first time in the past eighty-five years that the sessions of the Grand Lodge B. of A. have been held in any city outside of the Dominion. On the arrival of the delegates at St. John's they were greeted with artillery salutes from the shore batteries and from the warships in the harbor. On Wednesday the Grand Lodge sessions were opened and a big parade was held, more than 15,000 local Orangemen and over seventy bachelors required to carry the visiting delegates. 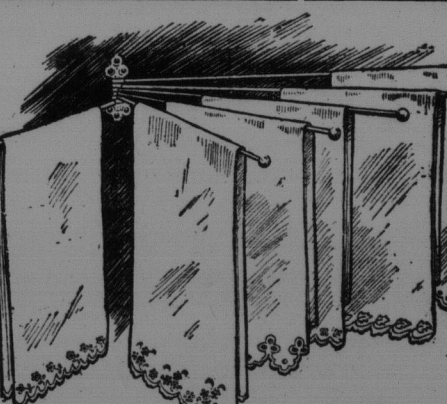
