

### Ask Eight Hour Day And Minimum Wage

**Cape Breton Workers Allege They Toil About Eleven Hours Daily.**

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 27.—Resolutions asking for a minimum wage for all workers, based on the cost of living in each locality, and for an eight-hour day in all occupations, except the seasonal ones, such as farming and fishing, were passed at the opening session here today of the Independent Labor Party of Nova Scotia's convention. With reference to the eight-hour day, it was argued that it should be "a real eight-hour day." Cape Breton delegates asserting that the eight-hour day now in force at the mines is in some cases real and eleven-hour day, because it takes so long to get to and from the coal surface.

### Struggle in Tokio On Siberia Impends

**Killing of U. S. Officers Spurs Opposition to Action—Want Troops Removed.**

Tokio, Jan. 27.—The question of Japan's right to continue its Siberian occupation, which was brought vividly into the international limelight by the killing of Lieutenant W. H. Langdon at Vladivostok by a Japanese soldier, promises to become one of the chief issues in the impending struggle in the Imperial Diet which today resumed its regular business sessions following the New Year holiday. Viscount Kato, foreign minister in the Okuma cabinet and president of the Kenseikai, the largest opposition party, made an impassioned attack on Premier Hara's Siberian policy at a mass-meeting of his party held in Tokio on the eve of the Diet's reopening.  
"Get the troops out of Siberia," was the keynote of Viscount Kato's attack, which promises to be continued bitterly on the floor of the House of Representatives. Viscount Kato declared that the government's Siberian policy was, criminal, rather than a failure.
