### From Ontario.

Toronto, March 8.  
One of the Presbyterian congregations in the City last night unanimously passed a resolution in favor of Presbyterian Union, but opposed the conditions attached to it by Resolutions of Assembly.  
Arrangements are being made to settle a colony of Germans near Oshawa.

### British and Foreign.

(To the St. John Associated Press.)

LONDON, March 7.—Evening.  
The Queen leaves for Germany on 9th inst., and returns 16th of April.  
President Fortescue, of the Board of Trade, announced in the House of Commons to-day that the Government were negotiating for a Shipping Convention with the United States.  
Operatives in the silk factories at Leeds Staffordshire, to the number of 3,800, have been locked out for refusing to accept the terms offered them by their masters. This throws one third of the town population out of work.  
Fifteen hundred coal miners of Seaham in the County of Durham are on a strike for higher wages.  
In reply to an inquiry in the House of Commons to-night, Viscount Eversley, Under Secretary of Foreign Department, stated that the Government had no knowledge of the Pope's intention to leave Rome, and that the Pope had made no application to England to place Malta or any portion of the British dominions at his disposal.  
Gold closed in New York yesterday at 110 1/2 to 110 3/4.  
In London Consols closed at 92 1/2; 5 20's at 92 1/2; 10 40's at 94.

New York in Sunshine.  
The streets are gay with throngs of people that have been tempted from their homes by the outside light and heat. A sparkling stream of human life runs these bright days in a strong, swift current from Murray Hill to Bond street, ebbs and flows alternately and continuously, from 10 in the morning until 4 in the afternoon, between these two landmarks of old and new respectability, those limits to which the real estate and family life, the old and new of most marvellously constructed streets corners and sunny sites upon street corners, and planting their tables thereon, proceed to exhibit the inevitable red flannel soldier, who utters a war-whoop when struck; the old gentleman in blue, who clashes his cane upon the least sign of encouragement received from the passer-by; to mention the tin canary, which sings only when filled with water, or the toy gymnast, who stands with equal ease upon either head or feet. Infant New York is pushed now in its patent perambulator up and down the sunny walks of the different parks by its somewhat inattentive nurse, whose conversational powers are fully appreciated by the huckster who, alike neglectful of his duties, walks by her side. The hand organs have come out in force, and in better tune, the monkey crows out from under the glazed garments of the grinders, and blink contentedly in the sunshine, anon winking roguishly at the juvenile crowd around them. The feminine four-year-olds, in rich attire, fondle most viciously their elegantly-robed Paris dolls, who emit wails from the machinery in their stomachs, and are rescued from instant threatened demolition by the French nurse, who so faithfully followed and so prettily burlesqued. The butter flies of the demi-monde flaunt their wings with trailing silk and satins; the busy bees bustle about from shop to shop, and the plodding men march steadily and systematically to their places of business down-town. All creatures catch these first premonitions of a warmer, brighter season, and all hearts are consciously or unconsciously made hopeful by this real, however short, that Spring force from Winter.

A Vienna medical journal gives an account of a marvellously tattooed man. He is an Albanian, very finely formed and about forty years old. Having got into trouble with the authorities of a district of Chinese Tartary, while working a gold mine in that country, he was condemned to be tattooed. This operation was, of course, terribly painful. It lasted three hours a day during three months. When the man is stripped it appears as though his body was tightly enveloped in a webbing of rich Turkish stuff. From head to foot he is covered with dark blue figures of animals and plants. On the forehead are two panthers in attitudes which would be heridically described as "regardant." There are no fewer than 388 figures on the body. The skin is now perfectly smooth, and the perspiration is unimpeded. This remarkable person is now at Vienna, but will presently proceed to Berlin and London, and not improbably will reach here, perhaps Mr. Barnum already has entered into negotiations with him. He speaks eight languages. Had the tattooing on the Tichborne claimant, who is reported to be ornamented in this way, been as well done, the proof of identity might have been simplified.
