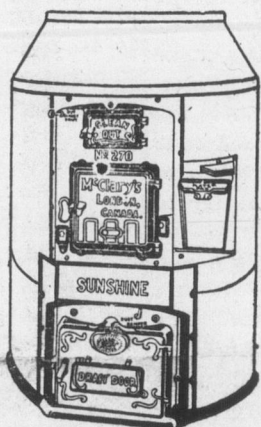

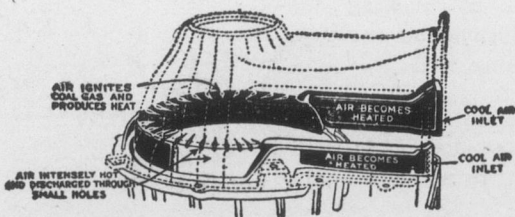

## SOCIAL CONDITIONS AMONG NEGROES BEFORE YEAR 1865

ed of discrimination in the choosing of juries in Toronto. "The Liberator" of January 3, 1851, has a reference to excitement in Canada West over the drawing of a colour line by the Sons of Temperance. There appears also to have been some trouble in 1852 at the annual militia training at St. Catharines, a Negro settlement being attacked. On the other hand, Frederick Douglass could write to "The Liberator" stating that he had been received kindly at a hotel on the Canadian side at Niagara in marked contrast to treatment received in American cities. "Were it not cowardly, and perhaps selfish," he said, "I could wish to leave the United States and become a resident in Canada."

There are numerous references by travellers and others to the condition of the Negroes in Canada at various times and it is quite clear that the presence of black people in this province was a matter of some interest to those who came examining the country. Reference has already been made to the visit to Upper Canada of Joseph Morris, an Ohio Quaker, who wrote his impressions for the Philadelphia "Friends' Review." A correspondent of the New York Tribune who also visited this province at about the same time (1860), says in his article: "Many of the coloured people are amassing wealth. All parties testify that the coloured man's condition is as good as that of any other emigrants."

The Liberator of April 6, 1849, reprinted from "The True Wesleyan" the observations of one, E. Smith,

under the heading, "Freed slaves, how they prosper." The writer, on his visit to Canada, found the greater portion of the refugees engaged in farm work, not waiters, barbers, etc. They had been represented in the United States as lazy and improvident, but he saw evidence to the contrary.

"I saw quite a number who had pretty good farms and everything necessary for life and comfort around them. Some are worth hundreds and others thousands of dollars. The laws there make no distinction on account of colour. The coloured man can take rank and place with his white brother and the fugitives may become a part of the community and share their portion of its benefits."
