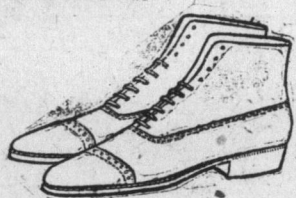

Toronto, Oct. 31.—Sentenced to prison before having been convicted, then convicted and sentenced again, then winning an appeal, which resulted in their convictions being quashed and the regaining of their liberty, is the experience of six men in this city. They had been charged with having Bolshevik literature in their possession and their conviction was quashed yesterday by Judge Widdifield.
