### Board of Works Will Recommend 8 Hours For Corporation Workmen.

The Board of Works met last night when many matters of importance were discussed on work to be constructed this year, and a recommendation will be presented to the Council at the regular meeting on Monday night that approximately \$7000 will be required by the Board of Works the coming year. As everyone knows who have had occasion to use upper King street the road from Young street to the boundary line was in a deplorable condition last year. The discussion last night was as to whether it would be advisable to gravel this stretch or to put down a cement roadway similar to that running through St. Jacobs. The last idea seemed to find the most favor with the members and owing to the fact that there is under way at the present time the building of a permanent roadway from the north of the County to the Southern boundary line this matter will be given further consideration.

The east ward storm drain has for some years been hanging fire, but if the recommendation of the Board goes through part of it will be built this year and the balance next year. The recommendation calls for a 30 inch tile drain from the corner of Union and Willow streets down Willow to Allan and down Allan by regular water course. The distance is about 1200 feet. The Board also took up the shortening of the hours of labor. They recommended an 8 hour day viz— from 7 to 12 noon and from 2 to 5 p.m. with a scale of wages ranging from 15 cents to 40 cents per hour. Fixing it on the scale of last year the 40 cents per hour men will receive 20 cents per day more and the others will receive not less than 20 cents per day more and will have shorter hours. Undoubtedly when the report is submitted to Council there will be some lively discussion.

### Housing Plan To Be Speeded By House

**ONE OF BIG MEASURES FOR LEGISLATION WHICH OPENS TODAY.**

Toronto Feb. 24—The Ontario Legislature elected by the people of the province for a term of four years, meets to-morrow for its fifth session. The meeting of the House after the expiration of the four-year term, is possible by virtue of the Extension Act of last session, in which the members of the House, with one exception, agreed to dispense with a general election until after the close of the war and a session had intervened.

The speech from the throne to-morrow will refer to the conclusion of a victorious peace and emphasize the duty that rests upon all citizens of the province to co-operate in reconstruction. Announcement will be made of the immediate introduction of housing legislation. Legislation will also be foreseen in connection with the loan companies with the taking over of the dispensing of liquor in the provinces and the extension of the time fixed for taking a vote of the people upon the continuance of the existing temperance legislation.

Special reference will be made in the speech to the plans of the Government in connection with the prosecution of public works, which will furnish employment to thousands of workmen—the construction of highways and public buildings, hydro-electric and railway extension.

The opening of the House though featured by a more lavish display of gowns than usual will not differ in the main from those of preceding years. The introduction of new members will afford a little additional interest, however.

Ottawa Feb. 24—Sovvenir hunters have stripped the grave of Sir Wilfrid Laurier of the splendid collection of floral tributes which came from all parts of Canada to the bier of the deceased statesman. Except for the superb crest sent by the City of Montreal, nothing in the floral line remains on the grave this morning, and even the Montreal tribute shows signs of "wear."

At the same time other collectors of souvenirs were enthusiastically, if rather discreetly at work in the Baseline and as a consequence of their activities the ends of all the candles used in the funeral service on Saturday disappeared before 6 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

#### Are Taking a Look Out.

### Liberals Have Named D.D. Mackenzie Leader

**CAUSUS OF LIBERAL M.P.'S AT OTTAWA MAKES ARRANGEMENTS FOR SESSION.**

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—D.D. Mackenzie, Liberal member for North Cape Breton, will be the recognized Liberal leader in the Commons during the present session. This was decided at the Liberal caucus to-day after morning and afternoon sessions.

A resolution adopted by the caucus and given out later makes it clear that it is not the intention of the liberals to appoint a permanent leader until a national convention is held, the same to be held "at the earliest possible date."

It was also affirmed that the arrangements for the national convention will be made by a committee to be appointed by the Parliamentary Liberal party.

The prediction that a committee of management would be named, under the chairmanship of J.A. Robb, chief Liberal whip, and member for Huntingdon, was verified by the official announcement. The committee will be associated with the House leader in the preparation and management of the party's work in Parliament.

**Official Statement.**

The official statement covering the proceedings of the caucus given out this evening follows: "Under the chairmanship of Mr. W.H. White of Victoria, Alta., the first caucus of the session was held by the Liberal Parliamentary party to-day. There was a full attendance of members and senators and the utmost harmony prevailed.

A resolution to the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was proposed by Mr. D.D. Mackenzie and unanimously adopted in these terms: "The Parliamentary Liberal Party, in caucus assembled, deems it to be its first official duty to express, as it does by this resolution, its sense of the irreparable loss it has sustained through the death of its beloved and distinguished leader, the Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, P.C., G.C.M.G.

**Grimming Example.**

"Though deprived of Sir Wilfrid's wise and courageous leadership at a critical time in the life of the nation, his followers are consoled

by the knowledge that his stainless character, his long and brilliant career as a member of Parliament, his unselfish devotion of all his great talents to public duty, his fearless advocacy of the rights of the people and his lifelong adherence to the ideal of Canadian national unity—constitutes a heritage as precious as the principles of Liberalism itself and that both now and in the years to come, this heritage will serve an inspiring example for those upon whom will devolve the task of guiding and pressing forward the work of the Liberal party in Canada.

"By Liberals Sir Wilfrid was respected and followed in life, as he is mourned and honored in death, and the members of the party here assembled avail themselves of this opportunity to convey to Lady Laurier an assurance of their deep and abiding sympathy in her universally deplored bereavement."

**Left to Convention.**

"After a full discussion, it was further unanimously resolved—that, in the opinion of the caucus, the choice of a permanent leader should be left to a convention of the Liberals of Canada to be called at the earliest possible date and that the details of such convention including the representation, there be arranged by a committee to be appointed by the Parliamentary Liberal party."

"Amid much enthusiasm it was also unanimously resolved—that until the convention already provided for be convened, Mr. D.D. Mackenzie be the recognized leader in the House of Commons."

"To assist in the preparation and management of the party's work in Parliament a committee was appointed of which Mr. J.A. Robb, M.P., the chief Liberal whip, was selected as chairman."

**Bavaria Is To Have a New Government**

**MADE UP ENTIRELY OF SOCIALISTS, TO BE ORGANIZED AT A MEETING TO-DAY.**

GENEVA, Feb. 24.—Prince Leopold, former commander-in-chief of the German armies on the Russian front, has been imprisoned at Munich on suspicion of being one of the instigators of the murder of Premier Burt Eisner.

A list of the persons to be assassinated by the reactionaries is said to have been found, and it is asserted that it has been decided to take 20 hostages from among the aristocracy. All the students in the university have been searched.

A provisional ministry has been constituted, consisting of nine members instead of eight. Among the ministers is Prof. Friedrich Forster, of the University of Munich. It is said that Landtag will reassemble shortly, but outside of Munich.

The Bernese committee of Bavarians has voted an annual pension of 10,000 marks (\$2,000) for the widow of Eisner.

**Rupprecht Sought.**

PARIS, Feb. 24.—Former Crown Prince Rupprecht, of Bavaria, who was commander of the northern sector on the western front in the final stages of the war, is reported to have been at the head of a monarchist plot that resulted in the assassination of Premier Eisner. The ex-crown prince is being sought by the police.

It is recalled that the last words of Rupprecht when he was leaving Belgian soil to escape into Holland were: "I do not recognize the Bavarian republic. I renounce and abdicate nothing."

### Fixing Responsibility of Beginning the War

**SUBCOMMITTEE COMPLETES WORK BUT FINDING NOT MADE PUBLIC.**

Paris Feb. 24.—The subcommittee of the peace conference dealing with the responsibility of the authors of the war has completed its work.

Its report has not been made public but as its meetings and the hearings it gave were attended by nearly all the members of the full committee there seems no doubt that the report will receive formal approval and be

laid before the supreme council. It is believed that the subcommittee has made findings only as to the normal responsibility of the authors of the war, and not as regards technical violations of international law by individuals.

Other subcommittees dealing with the various phases of responsibility for the war have not yet reached the point of reporting their findings.

### Ireland Sends Envoys To Peace Conference

**ZAN O'NEILL AT PARIS AS AN ENVOY.**

Paris Feb. 24.—Zan O'Neill presented himself to the peace conference to-day as "the accredited envoy of the Provisional Government of the Irish Republic."

O'Neill has sent a letter to Premier Clemenceau the general secretary of the peace conference and to each delegate in which he brings to their notice the claim of his "Government" in the name of the Irish nation for international recognition of the independence of Ireland and for the admission of Ireland as a constituent member of the league of nations.

This letter was accompanied in each case by copies of the Irish declaration of independence on January 21 and of the message of greetings from the Irish people. He asks that a date be fixed for the reception of these men.

Ever since it was declared that the Irish would send delegates to the peace conference, it has been generally understood here that their credentials would come before the committee on credentials in the same manner as those of any other persons applying for recognition.

### ACKNOWLEDGE REPUBLIC

Former King and Queen of Wurtemberg Bow to New Conditions

Berne Feb. 24.—The former king and queen of Wurtemberg in taking part in a recent election gave their names as Herr and Frau Wurtemberg thus acknowledging the republic, according to a report reaching here from Tubingen.

They appeared before the ballot box as plain citizens without an escort.
