New York, June 8.—The market in New York, June 8.—The market in all lines of spot and future fruits is dull, with the exception of California prunes for shipment out of the 1914 crop, the tone of which is inclined to be strong. A wire, received here Saturday, stated that French buyers were present again in the coast market, and this is expected to materially strengthen it. Local trading in spot goods is seasonably slow, but as stocks are comparatively small and are held by the few; a firm feeling prevails.
