From this it would appear, that an American subject might come here and contract for a vessel, let her be re-gistered in the Builder's name, and then get a Mortgage for her value recorded on the Register. by which meens the American would be the real owner, although the yessel would sail under a British Register. Should the Americans reciprocate with us in their Navigation Laws, we are of opinion that it would benefit this place materially, as the United States. At all events, under this order they can have an indirect interest in the ship, to any extent .- New Brunswicker.
