THE EFFECTS OF SPRING

Thaws Occasion Shut-downs at Minor Producing Mines.

Properties Opening Up Afresh—White Bear Builds Mill.

From Sunday's Daily.

Various incidents of more or less interest have occurred during the past week in connection with the local mining industry.

The Jumbo ceased hauling ore during the week, an inevitable result of the breaking up of the slighter rock.

The Kootenay also ceased shipping, and the mine is now closed down.

The Number One mine also went on the closed list owing to a shortage of timber, and the same drawback has affected the Jodie mine.

The Le Roi Two concentrator will shortly resume crushing after a close-down of nearly a month.

The temporary closing of the minor producers will affect the camp's tonnage for the next few weeks.

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MACKENZIE TAKES LE ROI TEMPORARILY

John H. Mackenzie has temporarily resumed the general management of the Le Roi company's interests in British Columbia, acting on the cabled request of the London directors.

He arrived here Sunday night and made his official visit to the Le Roi mine yesterday morning, spending most of the day underground.

It is intimated that Mr. Mackenzie's tenure of the position depends solely upon the period required by Mr. Parrish to secure the strength necessary to resume his responsible post in Roseland.

"I can't say anything at this time, for I don't know the situation sufficiently," said Mr. Mackenzie yesterday to a Miner representative.

He was accompanied by a week hence, when I have had an opportunity to grasp matters with some measure of thoroughness.

I have not gone into the smelter matter yet."

He carried ahead, and the crosscut at the intermediate level is to be continued to the mill connection in the ore body.

The terms of the property have been working steadily, and the prospects are now bright that the delay in the negotiations for the lease of the O. K. mill will be short.

WAR EAGLE—No change has taken place in the working plans of the mine.

CENTURION STAR—Development work has now been extended to the 200 level of the mine and this class of work is being done at the 500, 700 and 900 levels.

MILL MADE MONEY

LE ROI TWO CONCENTRATOR AC-TUALLY EARNED PROFITS.

JANUARY, FEBRUARY AND MARCH SAW CASH GAINS CRUSHED OUT.

THE LE ROI TWO'S DELAYED CONSIGNMENT OF LE IS EXPECTED HERE TODAY, but it is not likely to be started before May 1.

A broken shaft was encountered yesterday at the mill, and the machinery is shut down for a day or two pending repairs.

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SOUTH BELT CLAIMS WAITS ON SMELTER

LE ROI MINE SUSPENDS SHIPPING TO NORTHPORT TEMPORARILY.

ONLY MILL REDUCTION WORKS RESUME—PROBABLY FORTNIGHT.

All the men employed in breaking ore in the Le Roi mine were laid off yesterday.

The number of men affected by the order is between 150 and 200. The balance of the mine crew, which numbered slightly over 400, is retained on development work.

The property is situated next to the Homestead, and is said to have a regular formation. The ledge is claimed to be well defined, and three to four feet on the surface.

The returns are said to have run in the neighborhood of \$3 per ton, which was very much below the payable margin at this juncture.

It is intimated that one of the reasons for the suspension of operations is the fact that the Le Roi is in a shortage of fluxing ore at the smelter.

It is expected that a fortnight will suffice to get matters straightened out, and that the Le Roi will then resume shipping with a full crew.

It has been stated publicly, and the authorized reports on the question of looking into the virtues of the Hartney as a size producer.

The Wakefield is shut down awaiting a supply of water for the mill. There is no more room for the storing of ore either at the mill or the mine.

Since the 1st of March John Kinman and his partners have taken two cars of rich ore out of the Neopawa.

The Payne has started the shipment of its zinc to Antwerp. It has contracted to ship 200 tons a month. The ore is taken by rail to West St. John.

The Idaho concentrator started up April 1st.

The leases of the Chapleau are getting things in shape to commence operations.

George Clark, Wm. Bennett and several other Sandon men have at last secured a lease on the Chambers group, near Cady.

TOPLAR'S CAUSE CELEBRE WENT TO THE PLAINTIFF.

COURT DECIDED SHAMROCK PLACER CLAIM IS VALID.

Judge Martin, of the supreme court bench, has given judgment for the plaintiff in the action of the Shamrock placer claim against the defendant owners.

The Great Northern Mines, Limited, was joined as a defendant in the issue, but the action against the company was dismissed in the course of the trial here.

The judgment dismisses the action against Fraser, but refuses to allow the gold commissioner costs.

A carload of machinery is being shipped to the L. C. Park at Camborne.

The Great Northern Mines, Limited, is understood that it is for experimental purposes to be used in connection with the Oyster-Criterion stamp mill for saving the gold in the tailings.

At Five Mile the water has been turned into the big flume and the power plant of 310 horse power is running full blast.

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GENERAL NEWS THE KOOTENAYS

THE BOUNDARY.

The Providence mine shipped forty tons of high grade ore last week.

Four years ago several of the old timers went to considerable trouble in stocking the Boundary creek with fish.

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OKANAGAN.

The Bank of Montreal opened a branch at Armstrong on April 1st.

About seven million feet of logs have been cut on the Shuswap river this season for the Okanagan Lumber company's mill at Kenderoy.

The ore on the Black Prince is getting richer. Returns from last week's shipment were 190 ounces silver, 17 per cent zinc and 8 per cent lead.

Another new company has entered the list of incorporated mining companies in the province.

The King Edward Mines, Limited, non-personal liability bond office Fairview, B. C. Capital \$50,000 in shares of \$1 each.

The C. P. R. resumed its daily service on the S. & O. branch on April 1st.

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POPULAR CREEK.

A strike made on the Swede group exceeds in richness the marvelous finds of last fall.

Pieces of ore taken from a new lead when pulled apart show chunks of pure gold the size of hickory nuts.

The lead was discovered last fall by the late "Shorty" Day while prospecting, but nothing was done until a few days ago.

As much ore as the four men could carry was packed down the hill, and is on exhibition in the headquarters of the Great Northern Mines.

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
