Charge Cost to Subsidy of L. E. & N. Company Is Decision of Engineer

OTTAWA, Jan. 30.—(Special to the Courier)—Prompt action has been taken here by Mr. W. F. Gockshutt, in response to telegrams received from Mayor Spence of Brantford on Thursday in regard to flood dangers at the canal headgates. Mr. Cockshutt at once waited upon Chief Engineer George Mountain of the Dominion Railway Board, and laid the entire matter before him. The Engineer, realizing the danger from a break-up of the river, promised to give immediate orders, either to Secord & Sons, contractors, or to the city works department itself, to proceed with the work, so that necessary protection be secured, the cost for the same to be charged up against the subsidy of the Lake Erie & Northern Railway.

The effect of Engineer Mountain's decision thus establishes a precedent, and in case necessary work for the safety of lives and property is delayed along the river bank by the company, the city can undertake the work itself, and in the matter of the cost of the undertaking the same can be charged against the subsidy being received by the company from the Dominion Government. The decision is of farreaching importance.
