It was on the battlefield in the time of the Duke of Wellington, under whom Capt. Kingsley saw service, receiving £2 10s a day pay. It has been in the family since 1780, is a four-poster mahogany with brass mountings, standing on six legs. In the same family are linen sheets, helved, spun and woven by Mrs. E. Stevens, Connecticut, grand mother of Mrs. W. H. Kingsley, from the flax grown on their farm over one hundred and fifty years ago. The sheets are still in good condition.
