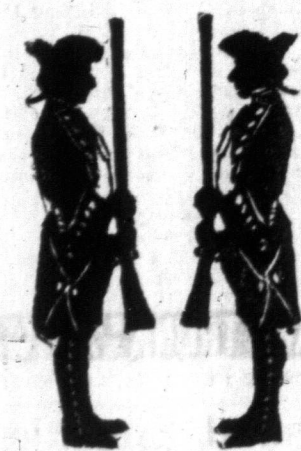

END OF WORLD

Adventists Believe the Franco-Turkish Trouble is a Sign of it.

Oswego, N. Y., Aug. 28.—The annual camp meeting of the Seventh Day Adventists of New York State began here to-day with about 600 persons from all parts of the State in attendance. The camp is in charge of Elder J. B. Thompson, of Rome, John S. Whitmore, a prominent Adventist, declared to-day that the Franco-Turkish troubles were signs that the end of the world was approaching. He said that the difficulties between these two nations would result in a general European war, the destruction of the Turkish Empire and world-wide suffering, ending with the second coming of Christ. He based his belief in his prophecies on Daniel, 12th chapter, 1st and 2nd verses.

ROORBACK

Detective McGregor Condemns Fake Sensation Concocted by Local Paper "Exclusively" Yesterday.

"I wish you would correct an article which appeared in yesterday's issue of the Banner-News," said Detective McGregor to The Planet this morning. "MR. BOYD" ROBS GAMING HOUSE

Carries off \$4,200 While Employed as Patrons Look on.

Simply Declares That he Needs the Money and None Dare Try to Stop him.

Nashville, Tenn., August 28.—All alone save for two large revolvers Mr. Boyd, whose first name is lost to fame, "held up" Nashville's leading gambling house last night and hastened away with the glad bank roll—\$4,200.

Mr. Boyd is a naturally furtive gentleman and he gave no notice of motion. It is asserted confidently by players and employees of the gaming house who were present when he unmasked his batteries that the weapons he carried were of a calibre unknown in this region. They say he must have carried the guns in turrets.

HE IS UNPOPULAR.

The community is deeply offended with Mr. Boyd. Moreover, it is wondering what his motive was in thus interfering with Nashville's leading industry. The general opinion is that he wished to raise a mortgage on the dear old homestead and thus prevent avaricious creditors from turning his aged parents out into the pitiless fields.

Worse and worse, it is believed that one of those dreadful persons known in criminal circles as a spy visited the house of chance before Mr. Boyd and informed him accurately as to the resources of the establishment and exactly where the money resided.

At all events Mr. Boyd seemed to know all about it. He sauntered in carelessly and "bucked" the roulette wheel in a careless fashion, losing quite a large sum with apparent unconcern.

ARSENAL WELL CONCEALED.

No bulge nor angle in his clothing betrayed the concealed weapons. Mr. Boyd even swallowed a drink between plays and smiled as if he were the better thereof. He kept his eye on the clock. When it chimed one, he placed his back against the door, kicked a negro attendant into the middle of the group at the faro layout and said:

"Here's a couple o' guns as fine as you ever have seen."

They looked. The little ball dropped into a niche unheeded. The monotonous rattle of chips ceased. The light fell on the blue barrels. Certainly they were fine revolvers. No one made demur.

"If you all will herd yourselves over there in the corner," resumed Mr. Boyd, "I won't keep you there a minute. If you don't, I'll keep some of you till the undertaker comes." He hesitated a moment and added: "I'm not exactly rushed, but there's a party waiting for me."

They obeyed, and in a minute Mr. Boyd went to the open safe, pocketed \$4,200 and departed. No one believes he will be captured.

END OF FARCE

The Royal Election Commission Passing out of Sight.

Toronto, Aug. 28.—The Royal Election Commission appointed by the Dominion Government something over a year ago, for the purpose of investigating the question of corruption in elections, is ready for burial. The commission is composed of Sir John A. Boyd, president; Chief Justice Falconbridge and Judge McTavish, of Ottawa. They have met two or three times, and did actually consider the North Ontario case, but the work accomplished has been absolutely nothing. And now the commission is dropping gradually out of sight, by lack of the necessary life to keep moving. Nothing has been done and nothing will be done. It is scarcely probable that they will meet again. The commission will pass away unnoticed.

SPLENDID SAMPLE

Dover Farmer Brings Fine Bean Plant into the Maple City.

S. Glenn & Son had brought in to them, by Mr. Thibodeau, of Dover, a sample plant of beans. There are over a hundred pods on the one plant, and some of the pods have as many as seven good-sized beans in them.

The beans were planted June 15th, and the result is the best seen this season.
