about ten o'clock vague noises were
heard and continued for a long time,
before it was ascertained that they
were cries of sailors in distress. A
large schooner was finally noticed a
few hundred yards from the shore,
south of the south pier, apparently
aground, and with heavy seas break-
ing over her.A rescue party was at once formed,
and with much difficulty succeeded in
reaching the boat, which proved to be
the schooner Anne Maria, of Alpena,
bound for this port from Cleveland,
in command of Capt. Alex. Gordon.The men off, and were about to start
