Coulter, of the Dominion Postal Department, in reference to the mail delivery which the energetic young member for West Kent was trying to secure for the Maple Oby. The letter is self-explanatory, but it is shoped that it will soon be shown that Chatham has sufficient population to warrant the Government in granting this accommodation. Postoffice Department, Canada, Ottawa, 28th August, 1907. Sir,—With further reference to your letter of the 30th altimo, making inquiry as to what has been done in regard to extending the Letter Carrier Service to Chatham, I beg to say that the free delivery system is only to be extended to cities and towns where the postal revenue is not less than \$20,000, and the population rott less than 12,000. While the revenue of the Chatham Postoffice exceeds \$20,000, time population is only about 9,400, and it does not therefore, I right to say, come within the regulations governing the establishment of the free delivery service.
