PASSED FORGED CHECKS

Tilbury, July 1.—Chief Wellwood arrested a couple of young men here this forenoon on a charge of passing forged checks. Both of the prisoners have been working in the oil fields, coming here some time ago from Pennsylvania.

One check was for \$16, in favor of Edwin Baldwin, with the forged signature of P. G. Murphy, Fletcher, attached, and the other check was for \$14, in favor of John Maxwell, on E. H. Argue, of this town. D. H. Edmonds, confectioner, cashed the Murphy check and when the Argue check was presented to him a short time later, he asked the Havings Bank teller if it were good. He pronounced it worthless, and also said the check cashed by Edmonds on Murphy was a forgery.

Murphy was called up by phone at Fletcher and said he had given no checks for \$16. Then the two men who gave their names as Edwin Baldwin and Arthur Smith, were taken into custody. They offered to redeem the \$16 check, and they received it and the one for \$14 from a man named Painter, who had left for the Indian Territory.

It appears they had tried about a dozen different places, but as the same racket was worked here a few weeks ago it was not an easy matter to get any person to take a chance on the paper.
