THE STEERIAN RAILWAY

.The Russian military transport authorities estimate the through carrying capacity of the S berian Railway for the next six months at about \$5,-000 men, and the necessary stores every four weeks. The est mate given by them in the early summer varied from 23,000 to 27,000 and the former rate seems to have been maintained Thanks to various improvements and to the completion of the Circum-Baikal line, an increase of 40 per cent. is now looked for. On that calculation Russia will be able by April 1, mext, to detrain in Manchuria the last contingents of 150,000 men from European Russia, or of 200,000 men if the transport of general supplies could be temporarily reduced. Nothing short of a duplication of the main line from Samara to Harbin is expected to do much towards solving Russia's transport difficulties, as the number of trains dispatched westward with sick and wounded and with empty tracks keeps on increasing as the campaign grows older. In the meantime the railway system in southern Russia has been most seriously disorganized by the war. The bulk of the available locomotives, vans and trucks have been diverted for war traffic, and the daily deliveries of grain at Odessa have been small and irregular at a time when the export trade ought to be at its height.

### GREAT BRITAIN AND RUSSIA.

While there is no doubt that the sober sense of Great Britain rejoices that war with Russia has been averted, it is easy to detect a note of disappointment in the chorus of the jingo press. Russia and Great Britain, for some reason which may be arguments of opposing speakers. E. traced far back into history, are regarded as natural enemies. In the olden days of chivalry people went around armed with murderous weapons seeking the opportunity of cracking somebody's skull or puncturing somebody's anatomy, all for the sake of honor. Just how a man could advance the cause of honor by driving a battle-axe through or by driving a battle-axe through another man's head, or receiving another man's spear into his own internal economy, no one had time to strikingly represented in Conan Doyle's story of "The White Company" by Sir Nigel Loring, who is constantly on the look-out for some opportunity of advancing chivalry and the glory of the ladies by engaging in mortal combat.

The spirit still remains in the German army, where duels are still regarded as necessary to maintain the honor of the army. What would be considered gidiculous on the part of any one of a number of individuals is considered highly honorable and even necessary on the part of the same individuals as a whole. The duel is regarded as a relic of the age of barbarism; but war, which numbers its innocent victims by the tens of thousands, is still regarded as a necessity. And yet there is this to be said of the individual wars of the days of chivalry, that those who made the quarrels did the fighting, while in the wars by nations it is always the innocent who suffer.

It is quite true that the North Sea incident was most aggravating, and it is equally true that there is still the possibility that those who were responsible will escape punishment. But ta war, even if it resulted in the slaughter of a hundred thousand men on both sides, would not ensure the punishment of the guilty. That is the
