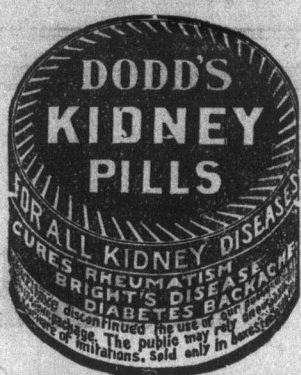

Pleaded Guilty to the Theft of Two Mail Bags Brakeman Gets Stiff Sentence From Magistrate.

Woodstock, Dec. 8.—The Minister of Militia has assured Woodstock that it will have a city regiment of four companies.  
Ottawa, Dec. 8.—The Canadian Northern Railway trains will be running between Ottawa and Montreal about next September.

Teheran, Persia, Dec. 8.—A slight improvement was noted in the Shah's condition Thursday and it was maintained yesterday.  
Toronto, Dec. 8.—The troops of Stanley Barracks returned last evening after their two weeks' of strike duty at Hamilton.

London, Dec. 8.—(C. A. P.)—The Central Unemployed body has received from Ontario an offer of work for 400 single men.  
Halifax N.S., Dec. 8.—Rev. Dr. Isaac Murray, one of the fathers of the Presbyterian Church, died at New Glasgow yesterday.

Burlington, Vt., Dec. 8.—Imports of lumber from Canada to this city have been larger this year than in any year since 1897.  
Chicago, Dec. 8.—The Hagenbeck circus has been merged with the Ringling show, which already controls the Forepaugh circus.

Washington, Dec. 8.—The House yesterday passed a bill providing for the protection of labor and industries from the convict labor and manufactures.

Kingston, Dec. 8.—Through falling on the ice-coated sidewalk, John Raven had his shoulder-bone broken. Mrs. Fleming her leg and William Palmer his wrist.

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—Messrs. McGillivray and Blake of Ottawa have been awarded the contract for the addition to the parliament buildings. The contract price is \$235,000.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—James Lewis, a young Scotchman, living at 414 Symington avenue, was struck by a train at the G.T.R. crossing on Royce avenue and had his thigh injured.

Fort William, Dec. 8.—Grain shipments from Fort William, between Sept. 1 and Dec. 1, amounted to 15,408,000 bushels by Canadian vessels, and 4,536,000 by American tonnage.  
Beamsville, Dec. 8.—Hugh Sinclair was appointed postmaster here yesterday. He has been actively identified with Liberal interests for over twenty years in the County of Lincoln.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—W. J. LeRoy, the brakeman, pleaded guilty to the theft of two mail bags. Magistrate Denison sent him to the penitentiary for six years.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—A. P. McKeen, son of W. H. McKeen of Hagersville, was drowned in the Cowleitz River, Oregon, a few days ago in attempting to save another man who had fallen into the river.  
New York, Dec. 8.—Dr. Alexander Macdonald, a brother of Dr. Charles F. Macdonald, the insane alienist, and himself an expert on insanity, died yesterday after a long illness. He was 65 years of age.

Ikusk, Siberia, Dec. 8.—The Government assay office here was entered by means of an underground tunnel Thursday night and gold weighing 185 1/4 pounds was stolen. There is no trace of the robbers.

Philadelphia, Dec. 8.—The life-saving station has reported that the three-masted schooner Florence L. Lockwood, from Norfolk for New York, with lumber, stranded on Williams Shoal, off Assateague, Va.

Montreal, Dec. 8.—The two Government steamers Shamrock and James Allen, which were caught in the St. Lawrence ice, and were in serious danger of being crushed, have been rescued by two powerful tugs.

Toronto, Dec. 8.—Prof. Wm. Osler of Oxford will arrive in the city, probably on Wednesday, and will be the guest of E. B. Osler, M.P. On Thursday night the Hamilton Medical Association will tender him a banquet.

Quebec, Dec. 8.—The steamer Aranmore, after several days' detention on account of heavy storms and contrary winds, has succeeded in taking off sixteen men from Cape Ray, and will bring them to Sydney to be sent up by rail.

Windsor, Dec. 8.—John E. Cook has surrendered himself to the police as a deserter from the Royal Horse Artillery, Kingston. He says he left there a year ago and has spent most of the time since in the southern states.

London, Dec. 8.—Col. McDougall, commanding No. 10 Co., R.C.R., at Wolseley Barracks, has been instructed by the militia department to proceed to Esquimaux on the 12th of this month and open a provisional school of instruction.

Kingston, Dec. 8.—Mayor Mowat has had a swim in the lake of the Yacht Club wharf every morning this month. The thermometer was 10 degrees below zero yesterday morning. He said the water was warmer than the atmosphere.

Quebec, Dec. 8.—Tuesday, Jan. 15, has been set as the date for the opening of the next session of the Provincial Legislature. A new Speaker is to be elected at the opening, and it is likely that Dr. Pelletier, M.P.P., Sherbrooke, will be the choice.  
Constantinople, Dec. 8.—Dr. Bier, who attended the Sultan during his recent illness, has accepted His Majesty's offer of a permanent appointment on the staff of the state hospital, due to the Sultan's desire to have Dr. Bier close at hand.

### Confesses to Murder.

Dayton, O., Dec. 8.—"Yes, I did it; I am the murderer of Dona Gilman." Coolly and without the slightest sign of emotion or remorse, David Curtis made the above confession yesterday. Dona Gilman, 20 years old, was criminally assaulted and strangled to death within 50 yards of her home in the suburbs. Employees at the factory where she worked subscribed \$4,000 as a reward for the capture of the murderer. The employer of David Curtis furnishes a complete alibi for Curtis, and no charge has been placed against him by the authorities.
