Terrible Fire in St John's, Nfld.

DESTRUCTION OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.—HELP FOR THE SUFFERERS.

Last Friday afternoon a man in a barn in St John's, Nfld., threw a match among the straw, which resulted in two thirds of the city being destroyed by fire.

Thousands of people are penniless and helpless. Everything was burned up before their eyes, and they barely escaped with their lives. Not only has there been an appalling destruction of property—the most terrible since the Chicago fire—but there was a deplorable loss of life.

National sentiment and patriotic ambition should be cultivated in Canada until the aspirations and ideals of the people measure up to the greatness of our country.
