By suggestion of friends, I prepare a short statement of the eventful life of sister Emily Day, who has just been laid to rest by loving hands, at about 90 years of age. Born in 1810 in the British Province of Nova Scotia, her maiden name was Bigelow, and she was connected with high personages across the water, as well as linking with presidential fame on this side of the Atlantic, President Garfield being a member, we learn of the same tree. We saw a transcript of a genealogy in course of preparation, running back five hundred years, Mother Day was married to Isiah Day, of Tennessee, in Illinois, in 1833. She was a classical scholar, graduated at Rockport in that state. Both were members of the Baptist church in that state. Emigrating to Missouri they joined the Christian church at Clark about 1850. Her husband was in the home guard branch of the union service, and was killed near Forsyth in 1862, this state.

Ten children were born to the above, eight have crossed the chilly waters, two only remaining, Bro. Thomas B. Day, of Springfield, who was present and tenderly ministered to her mother during the last sad sickness--Missouri Paper. (Emily Day was the daughter of Daniel Bigelow, of Wolfville, where he was born in 1810. He lived on the property now owned by John Woodworth, and did a large West India business from Mud Creek, from 1800 to 1820. He married Emma Johnson, of Wolfville. After the death of his wife he moved, with a large family, to Wisconsin. His son, W. J. Bigelow, (father of J. W. Bigelow and Mrs J. M. Kempton, of Wolfville, Mrs Emma Cook and Abraham Bigelow, of Cases, and Mrs Sadie Manning, of St. J. J.) remained in Nova Scotia.)
