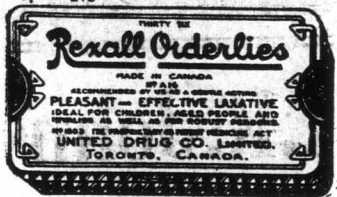

### ISLAND ROAD THROUGH CITY

(Continued from Page 1.)

and our committee who waited upon you yesterday, in reference to the problems confronting the Nanaimo City Council and the financial conditions of the City, we hereby submit in writing the pith of the facts as presented and the request made, on behalf of the City at that meeting.

1. The problem of financing and the absolute necessity of keeping some work going in the city to give employment to a certain number of our people, is reaching that stage when some decided action is necessary.

The proposed works to be undertaken and that have been completed, is to pave the main trunk thoroughfare of the island highway through the City, commencing at the south boundary of the city limits on Haliburton street to the city limits on the north on Comox road at an approximate cost of \$201,729.00, allotted as follows:

Haliburton street ..... \$50,000

Connection between Haliburton and Commercial over Victoria Crescent ..... 15,960

Commercial street (work complete) ..... 34,000

Front street ..... 19,769

Comox road ..... 50,000

Proposed subway under E. & N. railway ..... 32,000

\$201,729

The specifications of this pavement to be used is a seven-inch (7 in.) concrete base and a two-inch asphalt concrete covering with storm drains and curbs.

2. The City Council are negotiating the sale of treasury certificates to the amount of \$70,000 to \$100,000 in order to complete this, and other work on streets in the city, and our committee was appointed to wait on the government to request some assistance to finance this undertaking.

As the above streets are the main trunk highway up the Island, we hope that the government will see its way clear to make a grant to the city of say, ten per cent. of the amount to be expended on the above named streets to be applied at once to Haliburton street, which is now under construction and Front street which will be in the course of a few days.

Trusting the Government will see its way clear to grant our request and assist the city with the immediate finances they require, we feel sure that the Government will consider our request very modest and reasonable.

Victoria, April 9, 1915.  
Dear Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 9th inst., in which you make application to the Provincial Government for assistance towards the paving of Haliburton street through the city of Nanaimo, commencing at the south boundary of the city limits on Haliburton street, to the city limits to the north on Comox road, at an approximate cost of \$201,729.00, and requesting that the government contribute 10 per cent. of this amount.

I beg to say in reply that this matter was very carefully considered by the executive council on the 19th inst., and I was instructed to inform you that it was not the policy of the Government to assist towards the construction of main roads in city municipalities. I am sorry, therefore, to have to advise you that your request has not received favorable consideration.

of our wounded as well as wounded Germans lay in front of us but we could do nothing for them. When darkness came the German searchlights lit up the ground strewn with dead and dying. Of course it was impossible to obtain anything to eat and many of us went without food and water for 24 hours. But nothing mattered so long as we held the Germans back and we were in the height of spirit. Sunday morning bro. e and other troops both Indian and French came to our relief. It was just towards the close that I was hit in the arm.

We learned that the German advance had been completely stopped and we had saved the situation. There was not a happier lot of men in the world, and all we want is to have another go at them.
