From there the shade slopes gradually, and it has a narrow upstanding finish at the top. The seams are made by weaving in a coarser grass, and at the top and bottom edge at hicker kind, and one of a darker shade of green, gives a pretty and substantial rim. There is no striking color in these shades, the grasses blending pale yellow and light green tones in such a way that the general effect is neither the one nor the other color.
