Desperado Shoots Himself When Cornered by Posse.

Robbed Same Bank Before and

Killed a Policeman.

Eudora, Kan., Nov. 13.-Earl Bullock boy bandit of Lawrence, Kan., accompanied by William McKay, fifteen years old, of Jacksonville, Fla., to-day in an attempt to repeat his exploit of a month \$800 after shooting Fred Starr, a banker

In his first hold-up of the Endora State Bank Bullock, who is 17 years old, shot a policeman dead.

As officers had about decided that Bullock had left the State with the loot of the previous hold-up, he and McKayentered the State Bank about closing

and later probably mortally wounding himself when closely pressed by armed

entered the State Bank about closing time.

Fred Starr, cashier of the Kaw Valley Bank, of Endora, who was in the State Bank with his day's clearings, stood by as the outlaws held up the State Bank's cashier, Henry Wilson. Although Starr offered no resistance to the hold-up, Bullock shot him through the jaw. Snatching more than \$800, Bullock and McKay fled. Each youthhad two revolvers.

Cashier Wilson spread the alarm and citizens armed with shotguns, rifles and revolvers pursued the bandits across the fields. In attempting to swim the Kaw River, the boys lost ground, and a few minutes later the pursuers were at their heels.

heels.

McKay surrendered, but Builock, wrenching the revolvers from his fultering partner's hands, aped on into a wood, exchanging shots with his pursuers.

The hunted robber gradually lost ground, and, with seant hope of excape, stopped and shouted defiance at the fast approaching hunters.
"I'll beat you yet!" he shouted, and fired his last remaining bullet through

Most of the pursuers then turned Most of the pursuers then turned their attention to McKay, with the intention of lynching him, some announced. This attempt to deal out summary vengeance was thwarted by officers, who hurried McKay to the Lawrence jail in an automobile.

After Bullock held up the State Bank of Eudora on Oct. 11, he murdered Policeman William Pringle, who attempted to arrest the bandit at his home in Lawrence.

to arrest the bandit at his home in Lawrence.

It was while in charge of Daputy Sheriff Woods, of Lawrence, who arrested the boy on a charge of robbing a second-hand store, that Bullock drew two revolvers and forced Woods and Cashier Wilson into the State Bank vault. Then he snatobed \$1,000 and fled. After slaying Policeman Pringle. In Lawrence, Bullock disappeared. According to a statement made by McKay to-night, Bullock had been living at a fashionable hotel at Jacksonville under the name of J. A. Donaldson.

McKay was led into the crime by Bullock's description of the thrilling life of a derperado.

All the money taken from the bank to-day was found in Bullock's pockets after he shot himself. Bullock was unconscious up to a late hour, and he will probably die. Cashier Starr's wound is said not to be serious.

London, Nov. 13.—Rumors are current here to the effect that should the House of Lords reject the budget Premier Asquith and his Cabinet will immediately resign with the object of throwing upon the Conservative leaders the duty of providing for the country's financial needs. Whether or not this report is well founded a closer realization of the financial confusion is bound to follow.

The question of the rejection of the budget is giving the responsible Unionist leaders time for a pause for reflection. While it is known that many infibential men on the Unionist side are averse to accept the risk of the almost unprecedented course of rejecting the budget, the leading financial weekly, the Economist, devoted an article to the question, pointing out the extraordinary situation that would follow such action. Duthes of various kinds, it says, sanctioned under the new budget by the House of Commons resolutions, have been enfected since April to an amount exceeding \$55,900,900, and it is assumed that if the budget is now rejected these duties would be recoverable in the law courts.

Added to this is \$170,000,000 of income tax collected, which almost might be required to be refunded. In any case the Economist foresees a terrible financial deadlock.
