NOVA SCOTIA.

The last Royal Gazette contains the following important Despatch on the subject of the Fisheries of Her Majesty's Colonies.

NO. 12. DOWNSING STREET, 27th May, 1852. SIR:—Among the many pressing subjects which have engaged the attention of Her Majesty's Ministers since their assumption of office, few have been so important as those relating to the Fisheries of Her Majesty's Colonies.

These vessels will, of course, be confined to the performance of the duties with which they are specially charged, and the Commanders will be enjoined to exercise the utmost vigilance in preventing any interference with vessels belonging to foreign and friendly powers.

When we signed a Nova Scotia Charter on the first day of the Term, we assumed that he was specially interested in a case which the Crown Officers had declined being concerned in, we naturally concluded, that he had been purposely sent for. In coming to that conclusion, we were in some degree led by expressions that fell from the learned gentleman himself, and, as it seems, in combination with many around us. We had no wish whatever to mislead, and we are happy to correct our error.

CHARLOTTETOWN, Friday, July 2, 1852. SIR:—In Mr. Haszard's paper of yesterday, which I have just seen, in the notice given of the decision of the Grand Jury, relative to the two indictments prepared by me against Mr. Deane and Mr. John Inge, for the Libel published by them against the Hon. George Cole, it is stated that I had consulted Mr. Cole's counsel, Mr. Cole's special counsel, and for the main, if not the sole purpose, of consulting these gentlemen, I had the favor of your inserting this Note in the Gazette of to-morrow. Upon what authority Mr. Haszard has ventured to make this statement I know not; but the fact is, that I had no consultation with Mr. Cole, or his counsel, before I came here—that Mr. Cole was wholly ignorant of my intention to visit the Island till I arrived—that I had no previous notice of these proceedings—and that the management of them was not finally decided upon till I had been consulted, and were transferred to me in consequence of a very generous and honorable wish expressed by the Attorney and Solicitor General, that they might be referred, in order that it might not be said or insinuated hereafter, that the influence of the Government had been used to hear upon the defendants. It is not my belief, that Mr. Cole can have his interests more faithfully guarded by my management. This, in fact, is not his desire. The defendants are strangers to me, and I will endeavor humbly to conduct the legal defence of Mr. Cole's private reputation, as I believe most to the advantage of the Colony. SUPREME COURT. The following is a summary of the Criminal business before the Supreme Court in its present Term, up to yesterday:—The Queen vs. Ann McLean.—Indictment for larceny. The prisoner tried and convicted for stealing from the shop of A. Ryan. The Queen vs. Joseph Gallant.—Indicted for larceny. The prisoner tried and convicted for stealing money, 30s., from Alexander McNeill and another.

The Queen vs. Daniel Crew & William Crew.—Bill found for larceny. The prisoners absconded, and their recognizance is estimated. The Queen vs. Donald Harrington.—Indictment for stealing from the Queen's property. The prisoner tried and convicted for stealing a sheep. The Queen vs. Margaret McLeod.—Indicted for stealing from the shop of Mr. D. Donnelly. Prisoner pleaded guilty.

The Queen vs. Thomas Quinn.—Bill found for larceny and convicted for breaking into the shop of Charles Dempsey, Esq. The Queen vs. Eliza Crockett.—Indicted for larceny. Bill not found. The Queen vs. George Howison.—Prisoner indicted and acquitted for stealing goods, the property of Catherine Fraser. The Queen vs. Rachel Connor.—Bill of indictment found against prisoner for stealing money. Convicted.

The Queen vs. Hugh Quinn.—Bill found for stealing wood. The Queen vs. Duncan McLean, and the same vs. John Inge.—Bill sent to the Grand Jury, and returned, not found, since new Bills have been prepared and again ignored. The Queen vs. Ann Long, John Casey, jun., Michael Cunningham, James Long, and John Long.—Bill found for larceny. The Queen vs. Patrick Mannings, for stealing from the store of Mr. Robert Longworth, pleaded guilty.

FIRE.—A barn in Upper Queen Street, filled with straw, the property of Paul Mabey, Esq., entirely consumed by fire, at about 2 o'clock this afternoon. Although the engines were on the spot soon after the alarm was first given, the raging element had got too much ascendancy to be subdued. Fortunately, the building struck, and no damage to neighboring buildings was apprehended. The origin of the fire is uncertain.

ACCIDENT.—At the time of the alarm of fire, a boy about 12 years of age, named John, in the employment of Thomas Deahy, Esq., fell from a high loft through some open hatches to the ground, a distance of upwards of 30 feet. Medical attendance was instantly on the spot, but the recovery of the lad is doubtful.

By conviction, an attached member of the Episcopal Church, he lived and honored all who believed in the Lord Jesus, without respect of persons; and sought, in his daily intercourse with the poor, to bring them to Christ, and to the narrow circle of a disinterested devotion. There are circumstances connected with his conversion to God, which are so likely to be useful to others, but we are afraid to draw from the stores of an imperfect memory, a narrative which may have been recorded by his own hand, and may eventually be published.
