And further, that the Treasurer be instructed to open a separate account for this Fund, and invest the sums col-lected, and to be collected, in Government Societies, in order that the interest may be paid anually to His Lordship of the Diocese. He stu-died law in his native State, was elected to the House of Representatives in 1814, and re-elected in the following year. He was elected to to con-gress in 1820, and continued a member till March, 1831, when he declined further public service and retired into private life. In May, however, he accepted the mission to Russia. After his return, in 1834, ho was elected to the U. S. Senate, to fill an unexpired term, and sub-sequently re-elected in 1836 and 1848. In 1845 President Polk called him to the Cabinet, and until the close of that administration he held the office of Secretary of State. He was one of the two prominent candidates for the Presidency of the U. States at the last Baltimore Conven-tion; but the respective supporters of himself and Gen. Cass, finding there was no chance of electing either, the lot fell on the present Presi-dent. The Senate had finally adjourned. 
