FROM EDMUNDSTON TO RIVIERE DU LOUP.

To appreciate the merits of the French speaking peasantry of Canada, one must reside among them at least for a time, and have some knowledge of their language. They are universally distinguished for that politeness which appears never to desert their race.

You are welcomed to their houses in an easy and graceful manner, and they have the happy faculty of making every one coming under their humble roofs feel at home at once; there are then no sullen looks, none of that surly inquisitiveness which we frequently find in country districts in New Brunswick; but instead, pleasant smiles and polite expressions greet the stranger who may stray into the humble cottage of the distant habitant.

Among those of them who find their long winters in the forest, we find a marked difference in their songs and stories of the camp from those of the English speaking lumberman who too often indulges in an indecency of expression, which the Frenchman's poetic and refined nature forbids him to use.

Though we would not call them a very driving people they have other qualities which will, to a great extent, make up for the absence of this. Their marked economy which prevents the growth and increase of pauperism among them, allows them always to offer to the stranger a table bountifully supplied with the necessities of life.

Magdalen Islands.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS, June 17. Via PICTOU, June 18. Very few mackerel were caught up to the 15th, but on the 16th a good net fishing was made. The day's fishing, however, has proved small. Though there are over 1,000 nets in Pleasant Bay the fishery will likely be deficient both in quality and quantity.

A great deal of dissatisfaction is caused by schooners running into Pleasant Bay and fishing among the nets. This is complained of mostly by resident fishermen who say it will injure the net fishing and that the men engaged throw overboard the offal into the harbor. A complaint was heard against the manner in which the nets are put down, closing in a manner, the entrance of the harbor and preventing fish from working their way into it.

The materials of the Norwegian barque Fesinia Lent were sold at auction for \$1,100. No wrecks are reported. The weather is still cold and vegetation backward.
