Action Worth Of The Victory Cross

Comrade Writes Regarding Brave Deeds of Lt. Morrison Jordan Of Redbank

The following letter has been received by Mrs. Jordan, of Redbank, regarding her son, Lt. Morrison Jordan, who has received many awards for bravery on the Western Front, during the recent war.

Dear Mrs. Jordan,

Perhaps a letter from here will interest you, as I promised as a friend of your son, Lt. Morrison Jordan that I would write you a few lines either on my way home or after I got there so the boat is not rolling very heavy today and I shall try and write a few lines.

We left Liverpool Monday and we are now in mid-ocean, having fairly good weather. The boat is not very fast but is not had to roll, and we are not sorry as most of us are not very good sailors. We hope to make Halifax by Tuesday. There is quite a few boys on board and all are glad to be getting home, where they will get a good welcome.

I saw Morrison Saturday night before I left camp, he was the last man I saw. As he has been my best friend in France and in England when I joined the 24th, he was my personal sergeant. I was a private then, but gradually worked my way up as an N. Co. I was with him in a good many scraps, and soon I knew that I could not be with a better man. At 7:00 on August 22nd, 1917, when he got his D. C. M. I was in the thick of it with him and he showed there the kind of stuff he was made of. I don't know who would have happened to us that morning only for him. The Hun came on us in bunches but they were no match for him, they were falling to the right and left of him.

I was also with him when he won his bar to this D. C. M., but did not happen to be in the sector where he won his Military Cross, but two boys who were with him says he should have the Victoria Cross instead. He led the company that was left in his charge when all the others became casualties with great skill and made splendid work. He is not alone a good soldier but a born leader of men and there is not a man in the whole battalion who loves him but has the greatest respect for him. Only a few days ago I was in London and met the Colonel of our regiment there, and Morrison was the only man he asked about in the whole bunch. I often tell him he wouldn't be half so popular only he is a descendant of Cape Breton. That is because I am from there myself. You will be glad to know that Lt. Dan Morrison your cousin, I understand is my best pal in civilian life. Many is the day and hour we spent together and I do hope that before long I shall be spared to see him again. My home is only 20 miles from Dan's home. Many is the day he stopped at our house on his way to Sydney. I live at Mira.

I have promised Morrison to visit your home, if spared, sometime before very long. I hope he will be home if I do get up there. I don't know as he will be able to leave there before March or April.

Well, Mrs. Jordan, I must come to a close, hoping that I shall be spared to see you all personally.

Plans To Help Hospital Outlined

Hospital Aid Society lay Their Plans Before Citizens at Public Meeting on Wednesday

A public meeting called by the Miramichi Hospital Aid, for the discussion of plans and organization of aid for the hospital was held in the Police Court room Wednesday afternoon. A large number of ladies and gentlemen including many from Chatham and Nelson, were present. Mayor Troy presided and in opening spoke of the work and needs of the Miramichi Hospital, the generosity of its donor and of the need of advertising the fine institution in the outlying sections of the county.

Mr. W. A. Park mentioned the deep gratitude due the late Mr. Hutchinson for his generosity in founding and equipping this hospital, which was one of the finest in Eastern Canada.

Mrs. L. H. McLean, president of the Hospital Aid, who followed Mr. Park, said the ladies of the town realized the need of an aid and wishing to help had organized what is known as the Miramichi Hospital Aid. The Hospital Aid intended to supply to the hospital all new linens. When the labor was performed by the aid very much could be saved and much better material put into the different articles at less cost. The superintendent of the hospital would co-operate.

Mrs. McLean was followed by Mr. M. Tweedie, Dr. Moore, D. J. Buckley, Warden Burchill, Corry Clark and Messrs. G. Nicholas and John Storrissy, who all strongly commended the new society on their enterprise. A short discussion took place as to the advisability of forming a committee to interview the manufacturers of the county re aid in the upkeep of the two hospitals of the county, with the understanding that if a workman was injured he would be treated free of charge, up to a certain limit. It was decided to request Mr. Hubert Sinclair and Mr. D. J. Buckley of Newcastle, Mr. R. A. Snowball of Chatham and Mr. Leonard O'Brien of Nelson to undertake this duty.
