The Labor Party in Northumber-
land apparently regards the four
members of the Legislature who re-
present that County, as delegates me-
rely, sent to do their party's bidding.
At a meeting of the Labor Party held
at Chatham the other night, a resolu-
tion was passed to the effect that if
the Provincial Government failed to
comply with the party's demand that
certain work be provided for the un-
employed, the four county members
should withdraw their support from
the Government. It might not be
out of place just to mention that
three of these members were elected
largely by Conservatives votes, on
their promise not to support the
Foster Government. They evidently
regard these promises very lightly,
for on the only division that has taken
place, they voted with the Govern-
ment, probably feeling that the \$1000
indemnity was of more value to them
than all the promises they ever made.
