MUSIC NEEDED IN OUR SCHOOLS

At the Teacher's Convention held recently at Summerside, P. E. I. Inspector Auld referred to some of the things that are particularly lacking in our schools. Amongst these he noted the absence of singing. Here, it seems to us, Inspector Auld has placed his finger upon a very serious defect of our educational system which should be remedied without delay. In England singing is taught in every village school and nothing is more thrilling than to hear a number of fresh young voices joining heartily in the singing of their school and folk songs, thoroughly enjoying every moment of the lesson. The result of such training is marvelous and the people there are proverbially musical. The sound of harmonious and sweet human voices is in the air everywhere, and the events of a district are easily learned by the trends of their songs, their notes of sadness or of gladness.

At any time and anywhere all that is necessary is for one voice to give vent to its owner's feelings and in a few minutes the air will reverberate with the chorus. Many delightful evenings are thus spent and the sentiments of these people are easily ascertained by the character of the music indulged in. Amongst these people, music is a heritage, not a luxury; and that is what it should become in this town and province, where it must now regrettably be said that there are few in any community who can adequately take part in a concerted piece of vocal music.

DISTRIBUTION OF ANTHRACITE COAL IN CANADA

Toronto, Sept. 17.—According to information received from those in intimate touch with the coal business, it was learned today that under a United States organization now in process of formation to secure a proper distribution of anthracite coal, Ontario and other provinces of Canada will be given the same consideration in the allotment of coal as states of the union.

This is similar to action taken by the American fuel controller during the war years, when the provinces of Canada were allotted fuel monthly according to the needs and available supplies.
