## EDMONTON NEWS

### MASONIC SERVICE.

The Masonic lodges of the city, with visiting brethren from different parts of America, attended divine service Sunday afternoon in the Thistle Rink. There were about 260 masons in the procession, which marched from the Masonic Hall to the rink. The sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Jefferson. Music was furnished by a Masonic choir, under the leadership of Past Master E. H. Cope, and the numbers included an anthem, "The Lord is My Shepherd." The collection was taken up in aid of the hospital.

### WETASKIWIN HOTEL CASES.

Before four magistrates at Wetaskiwin on Saturday Messrs. Mills, Gardner, Rosenall and Olin, J.P.'s, the proprietors of the Prince of Wales, Alberta and Detroit hotels appeared on charges of selling liquor after hours. The information were laid by the license branch of the attorney general's department, and the case for the prosecution were conducted by F. D. Byers, Edmonton; while W. J. Loggie, Wetaskiwin, appeared for the defence. There was great interest attached to the case and the court room was packed to the doors. Early in the proceedings in the hearing of the case against the Prince of Wales, Mr. Byers took exception to the fact that four magistrates were sitting and an adjournment was made for a week to look into the objection.

### HAIL STORM LOCAL.

The encounter took place on the high bank of the river in the rear of the Blowsy-Henry block on Jasper avenue.

### HIGH SCHOOL EXAMS.

It has been suggested that the old school, which is a mile from town, be moved into town and a new addition added so as to make a two-room school in the right direction and we would say do it now, during the holidays and have school ready for the fall term.
