The Premier and Sir E. D. Shea.

We have been sent the appended letter for publication:

Prime Minister's Office,
13 February, 1912.

Dear Sir Edward Shea.—The Government have received with deep regret your letter intimating your desire to resign the Presidency of the Legislative Council, a regret all the keener because, apart from the loss which your withdrawal from this position represents in its personal aspects, it also terminates a record unique, I believe, in the annals of Parliamentary institutions within the British Empire.

I have been unable to recall any instance where any person has held, for anything like so long a period, a position in other Overseas Dominions similar to that which you have occupied for the past twenty-six years, and, in occupying, have adorned with such personal attributes of dignity and impartiality, unfailing courtesy and tact, ripe wisdom and sound judgment, as to have earned for you the universal esteem and admiration of your fellow-countrymen.

These feelings are intensified by the knowledge that your occupancy of this position is but one stage in an almost unbroken political career extending over sixty years, during which you have filled nearly every office in our Parliamentary institutions, from an official position in the Assembly, to that from which you are now withdrawing, and which has, on occasions, called for you to assume the Administration of the Government.

In this long and varied career you proved yourself a far-sighted and profoundly wise legislator, and your mind, enriched as the years went by with the lore of constitutional development, became more and more potent in swaying the counsels of the Colony, and in shaping the ideals of her statesmen, in the front rank of whom you stood.

You having now exceeded by over twenty years the three score and ten which the Psalmist gives as the allotted space of human life, we can understand your feeling that you should be relieved of the obligation which your distinguished position almost necessarily imposes upon you, of being present at every sitting of the Upper Chamber, and Committee of Council, will therefore advise His Excellency the Governor to accept your resignation, though with a sense of sorrow that you could not have seen your way to retain your post longer.

They are glad, however, to find that you have decided to retain your seat in the Chamber, the continuance of your connection with which will be an inspiration to the legislators of today and the days that will follow, to emulate your example and pattern themselves on one who was, in his private life, spotless, and whose public career was marked by incorruptible integrity, fearless adherence to the right, and hatred of wrong and injustice.

With renewed assurances of the most sympathetic appreciation of the Government, and their hope that you may be spared to remain for many years on the roll of the Council,

THE MOSQUITO
